VARNEY CHEESE FACTORY.—The  
Annual Spring Meeting was held Mon-  
day evening last. Last year's report  
was read, the total make for the season  
was over 13 tons made from 281,525 lbs of  
milk, an average of 107 for the season.  
This realized \$2,335.28 an average price  
of 9 1/2 cts. a lb. This season the Butter  
Fat System will again determine pay-  
ments. Steps were taken to co-operate  
with other factories to secure a Govern-  
ment Inspector of cheese to safe guard  
factories when disputes occur between  
buyer and seller. Messrs. Min. Smith  
and C. Ramage were reappointed Sale-  
man and Secy. respectively. The factory  
has been already running two weeks  
and the prospects for another successful  
season are said to be good.

clause 47, page 5, of your minute book.  
This clause may also be found on page  
10 of my last report. If you have not a  
copy of this Report and desire one,  
write Mr. C. C. James, Deputy Minister  
of Agriculture, Toronto.

As soon as the election of officers is  
over, and the points chosen at which  
you have decided to hold regular and  
supplementary meetings, kindly send a  
copy of said data to each paper publish-  
ed in your Institute District, and if pos-  
sible notify each officer and director of  
his election. This work can be very  
easily and quickly done if your Institute  
has supplied you with a cyclostyle or  
other multiplying device, or you can  
procure copies of such local papers as  
publish reports of your Annual Meet-  
ing in detail and forward a marked copy  
to each person elected, underlining his  
name in said report. If proper arrange-  
ments can be made with the local press  
the editors can do more to make your  
Institute a success than any other per-  
sons in your riding.

PUBLIC LIBRARY.—The Annual Meet-  
ing held last Friday evening was ad-  
journing till Friday 21st inst., owing to  
some reports not being quite ready.  
There should be a large meeting of mem-  
bers on that date.

Mayor Calder is having more courts  
and cases at present than he can hear  
of. A case of maltreatment of wife the  
other day came before him and the de-  
fendant was bound over to keep the  
peace with the usual alternative.

TOWN COUNCIL.—At a special meeting  
held on Monday night two by-laws were  
pushed through the usual formalities.  
The milk license is now reduced to \$5.  
The request of Mr. McIntyre for tax  
favours in prospect of building was laid  
over in definitely.

Editorial Note and Comment.

—The result of the Quebec elections  
on Tuesday last is another overwhelm-  
ing Liberal victory. So we learn by  
wire.

—A fearful conflagration occurred in  
Paris last week, whereby more than  
200 people lost their lives. A Charity  
bazaar was in progress, and being con-  
ducted by the nobility, a very large  
number of the dead are prominent  
people. The bursting of a lamp set  
fire to some curtains and being a  
wooden structure, it was soon beyond  
control. Fearful and harrowing tales  
of death and devotion crowd the de-  
spatches.

—The Arbitration Bill failed to get  
the two-thirds majority in the Amer-  
ican Senate and consequently is re-  
jected. The vote stood 43 to 26, and  
thus 4 more votes would have made  
the Pacific measure law. Senator  
Davis gives the reason, forsooth, that  
Gt. Britain's course in not helping the  
Greeks, and designing in the Trans-  
vaal caused Senators to vote against  
it. This unkindness, with tariff ob-  
structions, occurring at a time when  
Canada has extended her hand, should  
lead British merchants to foster Cana-  
dian trade.

—Everything in Toronto this week  
is sacrificed to the great battle of Sun-  
day cars. The World is the great  
champion for the change, while the  
News is the most prominent of the  
anti-organs, the Globe and the Mail  
being anti but not pronounced. Tor-  
onto stands almost alone among cities  
of her size in not having these con-  
veniences on Sundays, and on Saturday  
next her voters will decide whether  
she will continue to be the model Sab-  
bath-keeping city of the continent or  
not. While the voters will decide the  
matter the results will extend beyond  
Toronto. Toronto is preeminently a  
centre of influence in Ontario, and a  
weakening in her Sabbath-keeping  
record will affect to some extent the  
province. From this point of view we  
confess to a desire to see the change  
defeated though we do not believe  
Toronto will become a second Chicago  
even should the vote be decided for  
the cars.
