Newspaper Laws.

We call the special attention of Post
master's and subscribers to the following syn-
opsis of the newspaper laws:

1. If any person orders his paper discon-
tinued, he must pay all arrears, or the
publisher may continue to send it until pay-
ments made, and collect the whole amount
whether it be taken from the office or not.
There can be no legal discontinuance until
payments made.

2. Any person who takes a paper from
the post office, whether directed to his
name or another, or whether he has sub-
scribed or not is responsible for the pay.

3. If a subscriber orders his paper to be
stopped at a certain time, and the publisher
continues to send, the subscriber is bound
to pay for it if he takes it out of the post
office. This proceeds upon the ground
that a man must pay for what he uses.
