



## DROMORE CAN DO IT.

Hundreds of Enthusiastic Endeavorers Crowd the Church.

For weeks past Christian Endeavor Circles in South Grey have been planning for the great Annual Meeting (held at Dromore this year) and on Friday last the event passed into history as many respects the best yet held.

It was a large undertaking for a country church to invite this large body to hold its sessions with them, but right well did they perform their part, and visitors were delighted to find that thoughtful preparation for their comfort was much in evidence.

The day was a warm one, and teamsters were well pleased to find a band of willing young men with oxen and drivers on their caps, ready to take charge of jaded horses. One room of the manse at present empty, was utilized as a "hitching room" for those who came in that manner, two other rooms were set apart for wash rooms, and tiered and dusty travellers of both sexes revelled in cold water and a clean towel before going into the church. Some lounged for a few minutes among the shady shrubs of the manse grounds, and late comers to the afternoon session found on entering the church, that upstairs and downstairs was packed by an enthusiastic crowd of earnest young Christian workers, that is in the main, for not a few there were of mature years to whom such a Convention was a new experience.

The fine church was made attractive by an evergreen archway and other decorations outside, and inside banks of gay flowers made the place speak a welcome which rendered the motto almost unnecessary.

Down stairs there were bushels of bun-trunks of bread, great arrays of pie, and storied cakes and fancy favors enough to grace the weddings of Queen Mab and all her fairies, and thus at the proper time the hundreds present were liberally supplied by willing waiters who found that the people had provided so liberally, that after all were satisfied there was abundance left.

The proceedings opened with a song service by the choir under the leadership of Mr. Wm. Flannigan, and the hearty and efficient manner in which they sustained their part of the program reflected credit on leader and choir alike. They had evidently plenty to choose from.

Contrary to the usual practice the Conservation Service was held in the morning. Rev. Jno. Little being leader and upwards of 50 earnest Endeavorers took part in the usual impressive way.

Pres. Cooper's address came in the afternoon. He reviewed the past and called for even more active work in the future. An address of welcome from the home Society was read by Pres. Geo. Lothian and the welcome from the congregation was presented by Elder Jno. Allain, the pulpit being at present vacant. These addresses were happily replied to on behalf of the Society by Rev. Mr. Isaac, of Holstein.

Rev. Mr. Humphreys gave a rousing address on "Final Purpose—Religious Work." He condemned the practice of raising church money, by grab bag, etc. Nothing is right in the church that is wrong in the world, and vice versa. Right is right everywhere."

The "Open Parliament" led by Mr. Blakiston, showed the strength of the Society. Cedarville, Dromore, Durham, Priceville, Pricerville (2 Societies) North Rockwood, Holstein (2), Varney, Traverson, Yewill, Markdale, Woodland, Fairbank, and possibly others all were in evidence. The report of Miss Isaac, Secy., of the Union, we give in full:

Dear Fellow Endeavorers:

In presenting my report to you I am glad to say the past year has been one of progress, for which we should render thanks unto our Heavenly Father. At Holstein, July 3rd, one year ago, 28 Societies belonged to our Union; 9 total number of members then were other Societies have united: Knox C., Fergusson and Traverson, Elmvale Active, 228; Associate, 218; number of Church Members, 244; Presbyterian, Active, 588; Associate, 418; number of Church Members, 403, making a total of 1479. Two of the Societies that were members of our Union are not holding meetings now. Amount raised for God to bless all our efforts for helping and enlightening mankind and let us rejoice in the success of the great C. movement, which to-day has a larger number in its ranks pledged to go forth and rescue the world for Christ than any other organization of young people. I sincerely hope you all will have a pleasant time today and that this will be a very successful and helpful Convention and that the various C. and E. Societies that are represented will renew fresh inspiration so that our young people may be more fully equipped for efficient service in our Divine Master's vineyard.

This year the Convention was favored by the presence of Rev. A. F. McGregor, Woodstock, great worker, and a lucid, convincing speaker. He it was who organized the first C. E. Society in Ontario, subsequently his interest in the work is not small. In answering the "Question Drawer" contributions, he showed a fine readiness, with skill, yet kindly repartee. What difficulty some endeavours must have to keep from dancing! and how anxious to be right on the question!

Rev. Mr. Jansen read a paper on "Christian Citizenship prepared by Rev. J. R. Craigie, Hanover, who was unavoidably absent. It was an able and appropriate contribution to the program.

Rev. Mr. Hunter, Markdale, gave an earnest, well prepared address on

"Doubtful Recreations," and laid down three principles which should guide us.

1. Principle of Liberty.

2. Principle of Restraint.

3. Principle in the text—"Whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God." He applied these principles to the controversial subjects of dancing, cards and theatre, leading him strongly to condemn promiscuous dancing. Cards were a growing evil, encroaching on all classes, while the theatre was associated with so much that was impure as to be very dangerous.

Rev. Mr. McGregor followed in an address, which C. E. Workers in S. Grey will reckon one of the best they have ever received.

He spoke of C. E. work, its broadening influence on character, the effect of its music, "there were more people sung into the kingdom of Heaven than preached into it." The mighty meetings in Washington, N. York, Boston, etc. had had a continual influence, and he thinks that the secret of the unification of Christendom, if it ever is to come, lies in young people's Societies.

They tend to the cultivation of friendliness and of breath of Christian view, for "as no man can see the whole galaxy of stars at one time, so no one person or sect can see all of God's truth at once, for we don't all see alike."

There was in the society the energy of love, and the energy of faith, and he had only condemnation for those who had indifference, or opposition were found indifference these quickening influences. He closed by an earnest appeal to young men to be self-sacrificing while seeking to get higher as Christ needed them and this thought he eloquently impressed upon them as a closing one. Mr. McGregor will be welcomed at future meetings.

After the usual votes of thanks the closing "God be with you till we meet again" was heartily sung and a start for home was made, many going by way of the basement of course.
