WITH THE SCOTS IN PRICEVILLE.

Last Friday was an ideal day for a picnic, but it was also an ideal day for haymaking and harvesting, and this fact will account for the absence of many of the Sons of Scotland on the great picnic day. Morgan, Dundalk, who though not a Scot felt a paternal interest in them seeing they were descended from the Irish, a remark which was received by shouts of laughter from the good natured crowd, Mr. C. Ramage of the DURHAM REVIEW also was honored by being called to the platform.

Speaking over, the national bagpipes were produced and in the hands of Mr. Hector McDonald made appropriate music and an old fashioned "Scotch Reel" or two was displayed in good style, and it was dancing too, we wish we could give the names of them all but can only mention two of the most brilliant; Shoe maker Dugald McLean and Mr. Stewart from near the station.

The reels were followed by the round dances, of course to the violin and pipes.

It was found impossible to have the football game in the afternoon but in the evening the home team and another made some good play till the ball gave out.

Tea, Coffee and cakes were passed around by busy waiters, and soon after the crowd melted away.

DRYDEN AND WABIGOON.

Mr. C. C. James, Dep. Minister of Agriculture returned recently from a visit to the "Pioneer farm," and in an interview gives the following interesting particulars:

"The work of clearing is steadily going on at the farm and there are about fifty acres in pretty good shape. The land is very easily cleaned, having only a light growth of young elders, spruce and hemlock. The soil is different from that of Manitoba, being of a clayey nature, and you do not get the same success with the first crop as in the Prairie Province. The second year's crop on the farm, consisting of fall wheat, oats, barley, and potatoes, looks exceedingly well. Roots are not meeting with the same success. Apparently the country is not so well adapted for them. The hay had been cut before I reached the farm, but I ascertained that the crop had been very good, running 2 tons to the acre of timothy and clover. In fact, one of the most noticeable features of the country is the fine crop of grass to be seen in all directions. Red clover is to be found everywhere, and the abundance of grass should render

this a fine country for stock raising. The number of stock is as yet limited. There is a half-a-dozen cows on the Government farm, and I pointed seventeen cows in the herd belonging to the settlement that were browsing on the commons beside the river.

Settlement in that country is going on very rapidly. Four townships have been already surveyed this summer. It has been estimated that the area of arable land amounts to 60,000 acres, but there might be much more. It is rolling in character, and situated amongst a great wilderness of rocks.

The town site of Dryden was only surveyed last fall. To-day the settlement contains fifty frame houses, many of which are really handsome in appearance, and the population numbers about 500.

There are three hotels in Dryden, and a fourth in course of construction. These are crowded with guests, as prospectors are coming in all the time. Wabigoon, a centre of mining activity, is only eight miles away. Nothing is heard in that whole district but mining, and the news of the discoveries at Klondyke have caused almost as much excitement there as in Toronto. The settlers at Dryden are mostly from the older and more populous districts of the province, and they have begun to discuss the need of a municipal organization.

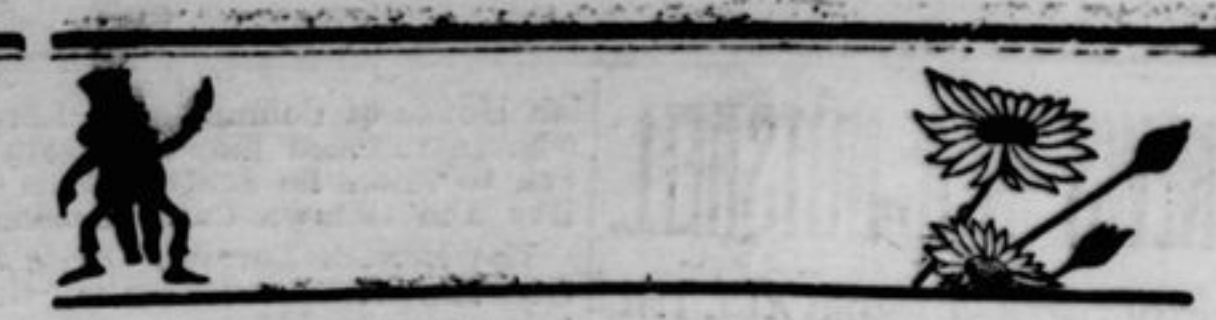

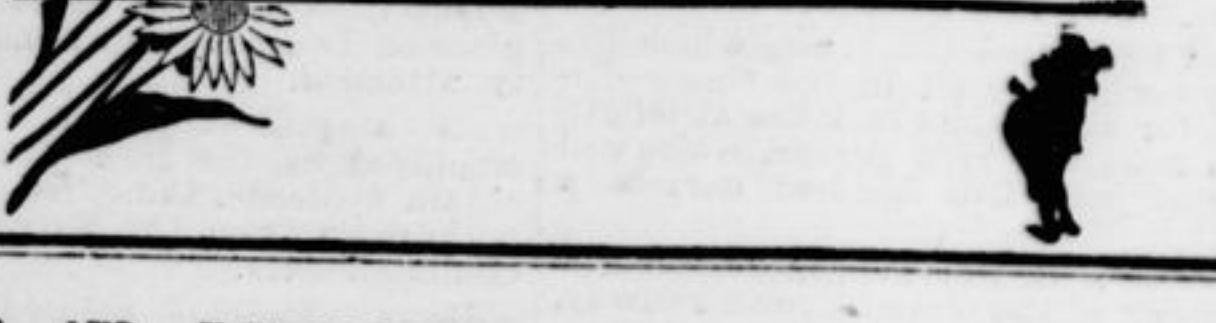

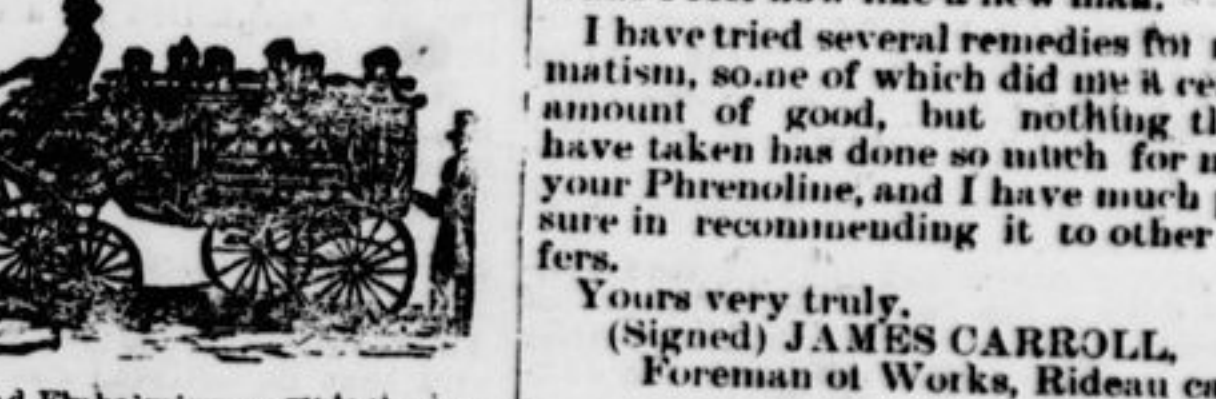
