Where ordinary success has followed ally find the stock in hand largely in excess of the accommodations there are for winter keeping, and with a number of birds that even in their pin feathers show they are not up to the standard. But one looks long and lovingly at a chicken which, with age, might so far improve as to be exchanged for a golden half eagle, and it is hard to begin culling while hope remains. Some points, however, such as feathered legs on a smooth legged breed and scant leg and toe feathering on an Asiatic, there is no getting round, and it is with these the beginning should be made. Get such out of the way first of all and remove the temptation to add new varieties to the standard or to modify clauses in it. Next, look for crooked breast bones and other deformities, but wait to cut for color until after the first molt.

Duck Raising. A firm that makes duck raising pay writes to The Rural New Yorker in answer to a set of questions:

1. Four and one-half to five cents per pound. 2. The Peking. 8. Old ducks do well in flocks of 150, if they have an unlimited range. We would suggest 75 lucks and 15 drakes for best results. One hundred and fifty young ducks is about right after they leave the brooder, but in the brooder only 100. 4. Clover, green or dry; green corn, rye, wheat and rape cut fine and given in bulk, one-third green to two-thirds grain. 5. The demand is always greater than the supply. 6. We have a good trade on celery ducks. We use no other flavoring than celery.
