

**Editorial Note and Comment.**

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is to visit Toronto about the 5th of October, and there will without doubt be an enthusiastic reception given him.

The fighting on the Indian frontier is still going on, with, however, an almost certain hope that the affair will be quieted soon, though at the expense of a "few more gone for Britain's sake." When the smoke clears away, the British Empire will be a few square miles larger.

Good times is now the cry. Among the many evidences is the experience of the wholesale merchants of Toronto who have made larger sales during the two fair weeks than at any fair for over twenty years. Especially is this the case in the Dry Goods and Millinery trade in which a large volume of business was done.

A notable event has been the visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to Ireland. The enthusiasm with which they have been received and the stimulus given to trade by their visit will go a long way to harmonize the two peoples. The visit seems to have been admirably planned scarcely any irritation having been observed.

The latest gold field is Michipicoten, north of Lake Superior. A rush is now taking place from both American and Canadian cities. The Ontario Government has passed an order in council bringing 1500 square miles of this territory under a clause of the mining act which will facilitate the work of the miners.

Ice is forming on Alaskan rivers. The two great storehouses in Dawson City ceased selling provisions July 26th last. Numbers are still going madly goldwards, and there is every prospect of a famine with its horrors heightened by lawlessness. The Canadian government will have its hands full if it can prevent the rule of might over right.

A lively duel is now going on between Mr. Tarte and the Montreal Witness. The Witness is generally sure of its ground before making charges, but really it seems to have met in Mr. Tarte an opponent who can at least give blow for blow. As to the merits of the harbor question on which the two widely differ, we are not able to speak.

The Boston Artillery Company have determined to come to Toronto this year. For some years back this body has shown a penchant for trips into British Territory, having even visited Britain. Everywhere they are made welcome and are the heroes of the hour. We would like to see a British military company take a trip to New York, St. Louis and Chicago, just to see how they would be treated. It would do good.

The birth-rate of France has been shrinking for some years, and so seriously is it contemplated that a society has taken the matter up urging the government to regulate taxation by the size of the families, and to give all state favors among the members of large families. Thirty eight departmental Assemblies have adopted resolutions to the above effect. Multiply and replenish the earth, or we'll fine you.

A fearful state of affairs exists in Hazelton, Penn. An extensive strike of miners has been on for some weeks and the men, chiefly Italians Poles & Hungarians, were getting desperate, some thought dangerous. Against an unarmed body of these men, marched a posse of deputy sheriffs, about one hundred in number and, neither understanding the other's language, hostilities were opened, with the result that 21 of the miners were shot dead and 5 more will die many being wounded. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of the Sheriff and his deputies and more trouble is in store. Uncle Sam has home questions enough to occupy his attention without dabbling in foreign affairs.
