The only question the owner asks is, "Will they get through the winter?" If they do live through till spring they are not worth as much as they were when winter commenced. They have developed immense bellies, because the food on which they have been fed was so innutritious and indigestible that they had to eat a large amount of it to sustain life. Their bones have not grown a bit during the winter and the amount of muscle they carry is much less than it was in the fall.
