if we exclude four regiments of Gurkhas, the corps of guides, five regiments of Punjab cavalry, six of Punjab infantry and four of Sikh infantry, almost the whole of the East India Company's great Bengal army-some ten regular and eighteen irregular regiments of cavalry, a large force of horse and field artillery, and seventyfour regiments of regular infantry, besides an immense number of "levies" and other irregular troops—was drawn from the North-west Provinces and Oudh. The classes which these forces comprised were limited to Mussulmans, Rajputs, and Brahmans, with a proportion of Lower Hindu castes, all acknowledging the Braham as their

ARMIES OF NORTHERN INDIA.

On 'the other hand, the armies of to-day in Northern India, drawn from the vast tracts of hill and plain, from the eastern colonies of Oudh to the mountains of the Suliman range, include Brahmans, Mussulmans, and Rajputs of Hindustan, Gurkhas from Nepal, Jats of Bandalkhand, Dogras from the lower spurs of the Himalayas, Sikhs, and Mussulmans, from the plains of the Punjab, and Pathans from the border country on both sides of the Indus. The advantages gained by this wide range of field and class in recruiting are sufficiently obvious. Not only is it possible to select the best representatives of each, but the diversity of interests existing among an army so raised is the best safeguard against general or combined disaffection. These are the main contrasts between the native armies of




