CROWDS OF PEOPLE.

DIRECTORS AND OFFICERS HAPPY.

Fine show of Live Stock. List of Prize-winners.

Tuesday it became apparent that Durham was to have another successful show. Wednesday morning's beautiful opening confirmed it and as we write this, Wednesday forenoon, pigs filled with happy looking people are pouring in.

The sheep classes never looked better. Brigham, Herd, A Muir all have fine pens. A Muir's lambs will be hard to beat.

The poultry show will be a surprise even to lovers of birds, but every rooster's crow or duck's quack seems to be saying "Give us more room and more light." The society will do well to listen to the call. T. Brown, C. Lang, C. Leavens, N. Harvey, T. G. Holt have good and varied exhibits.

P. Muir, Flesherton Station, is on hand with 5 pigs, his aged boar, a noted prize taker being hard to beat.

The Show is over and the prospects have been confirmed. Seldom has there been such a crowd on our fine grounds and it was generally remarked that for a well-behaved crowd both on grounds and street, Durham crowds are No. 1. The receipts were about \$300, slightly more than last year.

The grounds uphill were made attractive by the display of our implement men. Calder had two pretty buggies and other wheeled vehicles, a most serviceable kangaroo two-furrow plough, some walkerton ploughs, &c.

C. McKinnon's Chatham wagon was admired; a Brockville buggy, Wilkinson plough, Maxwell pulper, cutting boxes, &c., made a fine exhibit.

John Livingstone had about 4 rods of Page wire fencing erected and a lot of Frost and wood machinery displayed. A pea-harvester seemed to be a serviceable article.

Pumpkiner Connor had a fine pump working in an impromptu well.

THE HALL.
The inside exhibit was a very good one. Grain and Buttery classes had fewer entries than usual, though the quality was quite up to the mark. The fruit was a surprise, after seeing and hearing about, but fruit for a month past. Roots were less plentiful than usual but the big beet and turnip were there. T. Gadd's last year mouster squash had no equal this.

Ladies' work found many admirers though much grumbling was heard at allowing professional exhibitors so much latitude. The two photo exhibits were surrounded. Each showed a decided advance on previous displays. Brown's artistic arrangement of the Temple of Fame performers is a pleasing thing.

The judges thought very highly of the home made bread. Mrs. Matt. Barber took two important prizes, yielding first to Ben Williams' fine article. The honey, the pies, the pickles looked most enticing.

T. Smith's robes had much handling. The new process used by him in tanning is something unique, and robe buyers will be sure to remember him when snow blows. His harness was worthy of the prize bestowed.

Parker's exhibit of medicinal preparations would have looked well in Toronto. Calder's Raymond Sewing Machine exhibit made an attractive corner. Those "drop-in" and cabinet machines fill a long felt want. Closed, they form a handsome article of furniture fit for any room.

The flower exhibit was never so good. One competent critic says nothing like it is to be found north of Toronto. The stimulus of an Horticultural Society has had a splendid effect. The judges in the cut flower class, the ivy geranium and others had a difficult task. The hall, without this display—

Egremont, Yeovil, etc. Dr. Smith, Dornoch, and in fact we have seldom seen a larger number of representative men.

Messrs. Murdoch, Swanston and Lawrence, old municipal stagers in Egremont were in town. Mr. Lawrence was appointed collector of his township for the 8th time at the meeting of the council that day.

The grand stand was not used as much as if the day had been hotter. The booths did a roaring trade and the fairs had a harvest.
