A KICK OF A HORSE

Causes the Death of Alex. Stewart, Jr.

Last Thursday, Alex. Stewart, whose
family lives on the 1st Con. W. G. R.,
Bentnick, about 5 miles north of the
town, was strong and healthy and enter-
ing on a vigorous manhood. To-day his
lifeless body saddens the hearts and the
home of his family and has cast a gloom
over the community.

He was getting the horse shod at
Blacksmith Aljoe's, and while hitching
up, the animal, a sensitive, high spirited
beast, kicked him in the abdomen, ren-
dering him helpless. He was taken into
Mr. Aljoe's and later to the Central
Hotel where his wound was attended
to and friends notified. No serious
result was expected to follow but on
Sunday it became apparent that internal
damage had been done. Monday morn-
ing he was worse, and a consultation of
three physicians held out no hopes of re-
covery. Nothing then remained but the
kind attention of mother, sister, brother
and other friends, and this was accord-
ed to the dying hours of the strong
young man whose life was so premature-
ly ended.

He died at 2.30 p. m. Monday, and his
remains were removed the same even-
ing to his former home, and will be
placed in their long home, Wednesday
afternoon. We join the community in
extending sympathy to the bereaved
ones.

His father and elder brother are at Rat
Portage and have been notified. De-
ceased was 21 years of age last July.
