SEARCH OF THE CRAVED METAL. The old surface miner left Ballarat diggings nearly a quarter of acentury ago, when systematic reefing set it to mine the rock in the bowels of the earth. The last sensation on this famous field was in 187, when the Hirschfield "pot" was struck. Some one found a sandlode in a yard and followed it into a gutter. It was called "golden gully." It was simply a sandwash lodged in a small rift, or was the filling up of a small ditch from some rich source. More than 1.000 ounces of gold were taken from it. which netted the owner \$25,000, and set every crazy loon to digging up his yard for an expected find. There were over 2.0 "Mother Hirschfield," "sister Hirschfield," and "Queen Hirschfield," and with some designating number or prefix name! after the original ditch. It is now extinct.
