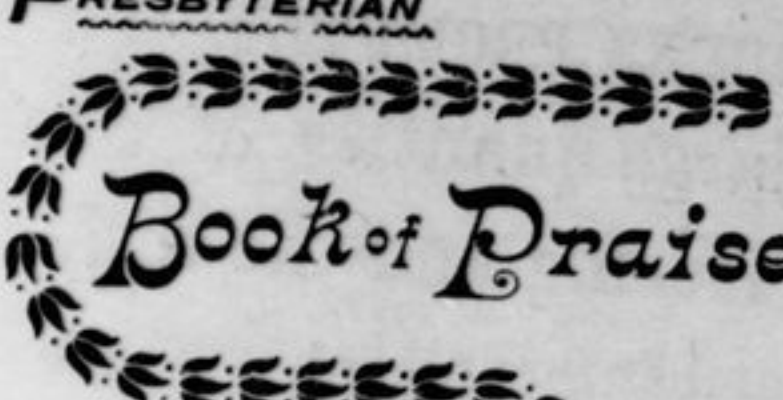

SCHOOL HOLIDAYS.—A recent decision of the Minister of Education is, that except in the unorganized districts of Algoma and Parry Sound, trustees even with the consent of the teacher, have not the power to shorten the school holidays.

THE SPICER MURDERS AVENGED.—Despatches in Monday's papers relate the death by lynching of the assassin who last February butchered in cold blood six members of the Spicer family in Dakota. The chief culprit was a half breed named Alexander Coudot, and he had two self confessed accessories, full blooded Indians, named Paul Holytrack and Philip Ireland. Their first trial, long drawn out, did not convict and did not clear, and a new trial had been granted. The populace however, no doubt impressed with a fear that in some way they would escape the law, took the matter into their own hands and a mob of 40, forcibly possessed themselves of the prisoners and hanged them all. Lynching is a horrible practice, but the slow processes of American Courts are undoubtedly to blame for its prevalence. Lynch Law is a long step towards Anarchy.

THE CHATSWORTH NEWS.—Messrs. Kilmer, McIntyre and Crawford, Durham, appeared before Magistrates John McDonald and John Cameron to answer to an information laid against them by the Inland Revenue Department represented by W. A. Bishop, of Owen Sound, for neglecting to procure the necessary certificate of registration from the Government. The cost of the certificate is \$10 and the penalty for neglecting to get it \$50. Mr. Bishop however, had authority from the Department to compromise the matter, and this was done by the defendants paying \$31.35, which includes the certificate and costs. Mr. J. P. Telford, of Durham, represented the defendants.

RAILWAY CHANGES.—Thursday last the town was startled to learn that Mr. Thos. Vair who has been Station Agent here for the last 15 years has been removed by the G. T. R. authorities in the mysteriously sudden way characteristic of the new management. Mr. Jas. Evans also has been removed to Palmerston the change in his case going into effect the same day while Mr. Vair leaves this week for his new position in Sebrington, The Grand Trunk no doubt knows its own business, but sincere regret is expressed on all sides that it has been found necessary to remove Mr. Vair from a position he has filled to the satisfaction of the public here for so long. His urbanity and civility as a railroad official have been highly appreciated, and our townspeople while regretting to lose Mr. Vair and family as citizens wish cordially wish them success in their new sphere. Mr. Evans too has won many friends and he carries with him their warmest wishes for his future success. Mr. Townier is the new agent, from Palmerston, and we extend to him and his family a hearty welcome on behalf of the town.

THE MAMMOTH CAVE.—The lecture by the Rev. Mr. Young, Hamilton, last Friday night was a very excellent one, and a good audience assembled notwithstanding unfavorable weather conditions. Mr. Young illustrates his lecture with a fine light apparatus and this was on hand but owing to an accident in transit to one of the tanks it could not be used. The lecturer had given his introductory remarks and had the match lit to apply to the gas when it was soon discovered something was wrong. No gas would come. An investigation after the lecture showed that the iron screw rod which liberates the gas had broken in the neck of the tank and would have to be drilled out. Needless to say audience and lecturer were greatly disappointed, but Mr. Young's ability as a lecturer, his fine voice, his interesting matter were away the chagrin before the lecture was half through and everyone pronounced it a success. He gave a graphic account of the great wonder, its curios in marble, its invigorating and uniform temperature, its pits, its walks and rocky passages crossing under each other depth below depth.
