For the four months of the fiscal year ended on the 31st of October the receipts were \$242,-000 more than for the corresponding period last year, and, judging by this and the partial returns received for November, the Postmaster-General estimates that the postal revenue for the current fiscal year will be about threequarters of a million dollars in excess of last year, or over 500 per cent. above the ordinary normal increase which has been taking place for some years past. This is not wholly attributable to the sale of jubilee stamps, the total result from which will not greatly exceed \$200,000, the largest part of which was collected in the last fiscal year, but is almost entirely due to improvement in business throughout the country as indicated by increased postal receipts at almost every city, town and village postoffice.
