G. McKay and W. L. McKenzie for deftd. Criminal docket—Crown v. McMillan and Campbell, case of cattle stealing near Shallow Lake. Def. McMillan pleaded guilty and made restitution. Allowed out on suspended sentence. Campbell was fined \$25, and bound over to keep the peace in \$400. Grand Jury have reported in favor of House of Refuge.
