D.H.S.—DIRECTORS ANNUAL REPORT 1897.

LADIES AND GENTLEMEN.—We, your Directorate, desire to congratulate you on the splendid achievements of the Society during the first year of its existence.

Unflinching persistence in advocating the advantages arising from membership, while canvassing, enabled us to run the Roll to the unprecedented and unexpected number of 108, placing us in the front rank right alongside of the oldest and most successful of the 30 affiliated Societies in connection with the O. F. G. Ass'n.

That body on the 19th of March sent us a free Lecturer, in the person of Mr. McNeill, of Windsor, who gave a lucid, interesting, and most instructive address on the "Horticultural capabilities of a Town Lot." The audience was fairly large, but not so much so as the merits of the discourse was worthy of.

The Government gives liberal grants to Hort. Soc., we received \$70.00, and directs that meetings shall be held for discussion, and for hearing lectures on subjects connected with the theory and practice of improved horticulture.

A Horticultural Exhibition was held in the Town Hall during the afternoon and evening of the 6th of September, Labor Day. The Society bore the expenses and a few individuals did the work.

Members obtained through the Society.—16 Flowering Shrubs, 60 Pear Trees, 62 papers of Garden Seeds, 111 Tubers, 433 House Plants, 472 Small Fruit Bushes, 491 papers of Flower Seeds, 300 lbs Field Seeds, and 4319 Bulbs of various kinds, grand total of 6408 articles.

The O. F. G. Association gave 132 of these as premiums for membership, members purchased 1334, and the Society presented to its members, free of charge, the remaining 4902.
