These were: turnips, impure water, rough usage of cows, feeding of refuse, wooden pails for milking, whey in milk cans, &c. The new President is Harold Eagle, of Abercliffe, 2nd vice President is Mr. A. Wengor, Aytou.

**IN MEMORIAM, DUNCAN F. CAMPBELL.**—In addition to the reference which appeared in last week's Dornoch correspondence regarding the death of the above gentleman, who is a son of Duncan Campbell, 2nd Con. Bentinck, the following will be of interest. He was overseer or "Walking Boss" over the lumber department of the contracting firm of which his brother John C. Campbell is a partner, the other partner being R. G. Williamson, Duluth. He, Duncan, was peculiarly well adapted for his duties, and having begun with them in the infancy of their now extensive business, his loss after 13 years of faithful and able service is severely felt, in addition to his loss as a brother and friend. His energy and insight enabled him to master every detail and to his care was left the management of many of the departments, both in the office and outside. The firm is this year taking out 15 million feet of pine lumber, and have in addition large railway construction contracts. His brother John C. left last week for the west, the other brothers will follow in a short time.
