THE NEW STORE IN LOWER TOWN.—Mr. Jas. A. Hunter and his staff had a busy time last week moving his extensive stock to the new and handsome premises in the McIntyre block Saturday evening saw the work completed, and on Monday morning the doors were thrown open to the public.  
The better facilities for display causes surprise where all the stuff was stored in the old building, and the new stock soon to be added will add still more to the crowded state of the shelves and storage room.

The proprietor is Dr. Shepard who purchased the property from the Hunter estate three years ago, and he will no doubt secure another tenant before long. Lower Town has gained by this change, but the vitality of Upper Town and its business establishments is still quite apparent, and we wish for the whole town prosperity and "go" for the future better than ever in the past.
