## A Majority of 531

### Captures every Municipality but one

#### MR. McNICHOL OUT OF THE RACE

#### Government Sustained by a Small Majority.

#### Full Returns of the Voting in South Grey.

The three-cornered contest in South Grey has resulted in the return of the Conservative Candidate by the large majority of 531. Dr. Jamieson, as we said last December when he was chosen, was easily the Conservative's strongest man and having no wish to belittle his victory we heartily congratulate our townsman on the support accorded him and on the success which he has achieved at his third trial for parliamentary honors. He will make a good representative.

Mr. Morgan after an honorable fight, has to content himself with second place, a position which many thought he would never reach owing to the peculiar circumstances of the fight. We thought, and think still, that his record as a Liberal entitled him to a more generous support from his party than results show, for scores if not hundreds, seem to have gone, not only to the Patron candidate, but to the Conservative as well.

Mr. McNichol made a fight worthy of a better finish, but he must feel now that he has contributed in a very large degree, many will say entirely, to the return of a candidate opposed to the government of which he has so much good to say. That Mr. McNichol's defeat was inevitable we honestly believed but not by so overwhelming a majority. Patronism, as a political factor is dead, whether the Independence it has infused into the electorate will result in good remains to be seen.

That the government is sustained is matter for congratulation. Their majority, though small will probably be found to be workable and a good strong opposition being assured, we should be justified in expecting them to offer criticism in the House corresponding to their abundant charges on the platform something they have not done in the past.

#### GOVERNMENT CONTROL.

The large payments to railway companies made for transportation of the mails, which we give in another column, furnish an argument for governmental control of transportation as well as communication and the time will come when this will have to be done. We are witnessing at present a rate war between the two large companies by which one or both must lose large sums of money for a short time, but the result, as every one knows will be that before long an understanding will be arrived at, and the public will be compelled to pay the old rates and very probably more. In addition to this, to keep their dividends up, it is in every way likely they will try "to reduce expenses," which generally means reduced wages or overworked men. We believe the time is approaching when government will be forced to organize for industry and interchange of products, just as they are at present for purposes of defence, collection of revenue, Post office, etc. If not on the lines suggested by Henry George, Bellamy etc., in some way approximating thereto. There can be no question that had such organization been in existence for the past few years our Western areas would have had a larger population and charges of railway monopoly grinding the farmers and other producers would have been unheard of.
