### DIVISION COURT.

His Honor Judge Morrison presided at Division Court here on Wednesday last, when over a dozen cases were disposed of, besides a few judgment summonses. The following is a short synopsis of the cases:—

Bruet et al.—vs—McCormick.—This was an action of damages brought by the plaintiff against the defendant because he had, it was alleged re-sold cattle, which had been purchased from him by plaintiff—judgment for plaintiff \$100 and costs. Messrs. Chas. Elliot and A. G. McKay for plaintiff, J. P. Telford for defendant.

Grant—vs—McGillvray.—Action on promissory note—judgment for plaintiff for full amount.

Tedford—vs—Fallaise.—Action brought by plaintiff to recover value of a dog, alleged to have been poisoned by defendant. Defendant is a farmer in Glenelg and had set out poison for foxes, which had been poisoning his hen roost. The judge held that defendant had not exercised sufficient care in setting out poison, and judgment was entered for plaintiff for \$25.00 and costs. A. G. McKay for plaintiff, J. C.
