The coinage of one cent pieces netted the Government a profit of \$6,911 last year. Altogether one million of these handy coins were minted in England for the Canadian Government. We paid \$1,710 for the metal, \$1,000 for manufacturing, and the freight brought the total cost up to \$3,100 for \$10,000 worth of copper coins. These were distributed as follows: 500,000 at Toronto, 300,000 at Montreal, 100,000 at Halifax, and 100,000 at St. John.—Ex.

FOUR CITIZENS OF THE TOWN.—Eugene Murphy, Wm. Thornton, Wm. Smith and R. O'Neil, came near meeting a watery grave on Saturday evening. A stick of timber got into the water wheel at Mr. Murphy's saw mill and the men shut down the gates so that they might remove the cause of the trouble. Some water was still getting through, however, and the four got up from beside the wheel to get something to stop up the leaks. They had no sooner landed upon solid earth than the centre post gave way and the gates burst open. In an instant the spot where the men had been standing was covered with fourteen feet of water. Had they not so fortunately found it necessary to change their position nothing could have saved their lives.—Mt. Forest Confederate.
