**MINING FOR GOLD** in B. C.—Mr. Geo. Ferguson, who has been for some weeks among us gave a lecture in the Methodist Church on Monday evening which was eminently worthy of a larger audience, of which he is entirely devoid of a subject, of which he has acquired a knowledge in the school of practical experience, and his presentation of it is done in a manner so forcible and graphic and with such naive and humor as to rivet the attention of his audience. To anyone going west this lecture would prove of great value, and will indeed would the "At Home" he will not be greatly interested therein. He outlined the glacial process, which scooping out the valleys by their mighty force had ground the quartz rock to pieces liberating the gold, which by its weight always works to the bottom. The vast areas of mineral mountains and valleys yet unexplored makes the Klondike sink into insignificance and the Senate in common with most people failed to grasp this. Gold mining would only be beginning a few years from now and centuries hence there will be excitement over the "metak." These collections properly labeled were sent last week through Dr. Jamieson M. P. P., to Mr. A. Blue, Director of the Bureau of Mines, Toronto, for his opinion, and this is his reply.

**Office of Bureau of Mines,**  
Toronto, March 30th, '98.  
Dear Sir,—The samples of Marl forwarded by you, received this morning. Nos. 1 and 2 are mixed with a large proportion of peat and clay matter and would have little value as material for the manufacture of Portland Cement. Nos. 3 and 4 are of good quality and if a large quantity is obtainable it will no doubt prove useful for cement making. No. 3 appears to contain less earthy material than No. 4. A. Blue, Director.

Mr. McKechnie informs us that Nos. 2 and 4 were taken from the surface of a bank from a foot or so below, and it would seem that the farther down the better. If this theory "pans out," the quite extensive deposits near by may prove a source of profit to the district, and we hope the observations so auspiciously begun, may be carried further till it be ascertained just what commercial values in this source of natural wealth.

Spain's reply was given last week. It was not satisfactory, yet President McKinley delays before giving his message to Congress, Monday—Tuesday—Wednesday—perhaps longer. It would appear that the nations having made ready for war, are withheld from striking by the enormity of the calamity which must follow the action of modern engines of death and destruction.
