## W. C. T. U.

Tobacco and Cigarettes.

The awful results of the tobacco habit are felt in every community. Every teacher in our public and high schools realizes to some extent the bad effect that the habit has upon the boys. It destroys the ability of the boy to apply himself to study, and prevents him comprehending or remembering his lessons. The mental faculties of a boy under the influence of narcotics are in a stupor, and since depraved nerve power, stultifies and weakens the will power no boy can show a good record who is addicted to the habit.

It is stated by good authority that there are three girls graduating from our schools and colleges to one boy, and this can only be accounted for by the use of tobacco among the boys; which has rendered them incapable of holding their own with the girls. The habit, which seems to be cursing and blighting the youth of our land more than all other evils combined is that of cigarette smoking. In order that we may have some idea as to the extent that this habit is practiced, I quote the following statistics: During the past fiscal year there were over 55,143,500 cigarettes taken out of bond for consumption. Computing these at the low retail figure of fifty cents per hundred, we find them worth \$275,717.50. Just think of the waste of money and wretched lives that this represents! Medical science tells us that there five poisons in the ordinary cigarette—the oil of paper, the oil of nicotine, the oil in flavoring, saltpetre and opium, the united testimony of all physicians is, that it depresses the nervous system, that it takes away twenty-five per cent of the physical vigor of this generation; it wrecks the mind and crucifies all the sympathies of man's spiritual nature. The use of tobacco more than anything else disqualifies the mind for exercising its intuitions concerning the right and the wrong, and it degrades the moral sense. The vital question for us to consider now, is how can we overcome this evil. There is no power better
