When General Isaac Brock was on march to Queenston in 1812 he stopped over at the farmhouse of Daniel Ostrom in Sidney. A baby was there and he dandled it. That baby died the other night in the person of Isaac Brock Ostrom, one of the oldest natives of the township. He was a Conservative, a Methodist and an Orangeman. Two daughters and his widow survive him.—Huron Expositor.

**FISHY.**—Last Monday fishing lines were let loose over our streams by experienced and expert fishers, Prof. Peel and his father, Mr. Allan, Bert McDonald, Allan McFarlane, are among those who have caught pounders or over. [Later, Messrs Elliot and McCaul caught a fine string too, and in turn got caught by the lessee of that part of the stream who "hooked" their fish a second time as a warning for the future.]

At the Durham Division Court last week the Mt. Forest Woolen Mills Co. (limited) found it necessary to sue several shareholders for unpaid calls on stock. The result being that the Coy. obtained judgments for full claim and costs in each case, viz: Geo. Shier who failed to pay four calls of \$2.00 each or \$8.00 was ordered by the Court to pay \$9.00 and \$1.02 costs, or \$10.02. In the case of John Klomp he had to pay \$13.75 instead of \$10.00 and Samuel Morrison \$17.58 instead of \$10.00.

The McKechnie Creamery will re-open for the season's business on Tuesday next. At least 12 routes are to be made this year and so an extensive year's business should be ahead of them. The excellent facilities for cold storage are factors tending to profitable marketing, with the refrigerator service supplied by government enables shipments to be made to old country markets in a profitable way. With still prices for "creamery," a capable maker, Mr. Wilson, and pushing proprietors in the firm, patrons of the creamery are to be congratulated on the prospect.

**A TEMPERANCE HOUSE.**—The Mt. Forest Representative says "Some surprise was felt at the decision of the commissioners to cut off the McQuillan House which is the third best hotel building in the town, and a public house that would do credit to any place. Now that the die has been cast for ever, and the house is not to be licensed the wish has been expressed that satisfactory arrangements might be made by Mr. McQuillan to run or lease the premises as a temperance house, and give the temperance community an opportunity of supporting such an establishment, particularly now that the plebiscite campaign is in sight.

**FARMER - VENUS - BUYER.**—At the Division Court held last week there were two cases of dispute between buyer and seller, arising from a practice which should be watched with the utmost care. A buyer comes along and buys some stock, paying a dollar or some small sum as earnest money and promising to take away the stock in a specified time. That time expires, no buyer comes along and after waiting a while the farmer sells the article intending to return the earnest money first chance. Unless the farmer gets the buyers sanction to this, in writing, he is likely in a law court to get the worst of it as in the two cases last week. For both parties it is better to be safe than sorry, and make explicit bargains.

**ARBOR DAY.**—Let it be remembered that Friday May 6, is Arbor Day. A general movement should be made if possible to beautify our streets by the planting of trees, shrubs, &c. The day has not yet been recognized as it ought by the general public, being looked upon chiefly as a school affair, but while the present school generation are being trained in its observance, it should not be idle. On our gala days great efforts are made to have our streets attractive by sticking up evergreens, to be commended for a day or two, and then removed as eyesores as they decay. The same effort put forth in planting living trees, would by and by give us permanent beauty, without ephemeral efforts at tinsel decorations. May 6th is a good day, but any day near it would do and the season should be extended.
