The New York World prints the fellowing cable letter descriptive of the obsequies of Mr Gladstone, written by Mr. T. P. O'Conner, M. P., editor of the London Star :-

The bedy of England's greatest man, Wm. E. Gladstone, was to-day laid in the Valhalla of his race. Military pomp and the outward trappings of pageantry were absent, but the ceremony was glerified by the homage of his greatest surviving contemporaries and by the sentiment of universal reverence expressed in the outspoken gratitude of a free people.

Whatever meagreness in grandeur there was during the lying-in-state, there was none about the funeral. In every respect that ceremony was im pressive, lefty, dignified. This was fitting to the funeral of one who after all was essentially civilian. There were no nodding plumes, no mighty procession, for the coffin was carried on a simple funeral carriage, and the distance between Westminster Hall and Westminister Abbey is but a few steps.

But the people, as during the lying-in state, were an impressive sight. Every spot on which the eye rested swarmed with human beings. They peeped at you from the windows of the hospital, from the roofs of houses. Everybody nearly was dressed in black and there was the same unbroken sombreness in demeanor which has been so characteristic of them the past few days. The unbroken silence of this yast multitude added immensely to one's sense of the magnitude and solemnity of the occasion.

The procession of the members of Parliament formed in the House of Commons as early as 9.30. The chamber presented an appearance at once curious and impressive.

Parliament at the Funeral.

There must have been 400 members present, and considering the holidays have already begun, this was marvellous. It is said not a single Liberal member was absent, except invalids and Gladstone's opponents. The Tories were also fully represented. The Irish members were some 40 strong, a very considerable number considering that it is vacation time and the present condition of the party. Live Stock Markets.

There was a fairly heavy runlof stuff at the western cattle yards to-day, but mostly everything was cleared up before the close of the day. Receipts tomost closely associated with his leader- day were 71 car-loads, and there were as well several carloads which arrived yesterday. The offerings included 200 sheep and lambs and 1,500 hogs, and about 20 milch cows and springers. Prices generally were firm.

Export cattle-The demand is only steady and prices rule weak at from 34c to 41c per lb, Some few fancy heads sell for about \$4 30.

Butchers' cattle-Sales were a little slow and some of the poorer cattle were on the boards a long time. Prices show very little change. Choice butchers' cattle sell for 3%c to 4c per lb, only a few medium cattle sold for from 3c to 34c

Bulls-There was a fair demand for bulls for export at from 31c to 31c per lb. Feeding bulls are quiet and unchan-

Stockers and feeders-Buffalo men were acting not quite so freely and the result was that prices sagged a little. selling from \$3.75 to \$3.90 per cwt.

Sheep and lambs-There was only a quiet trade done in this line. The offerings were light and the demand slow. Yearlings sell from 4tc to 5c. Spring

Calves-Light run and prices unchanged at from \$3 to \$5 per head mostly, Some fancy yeals would fetch more. Milch cows and springers-Dairymen

are about supplied, and the market was slightly weaker, at from \$22 to \$42 each. Hogs-There is no change in this line, but the feeling is weak. The top figure was 5c per lb for the best singers weighed off the cars. There were perhaps a few fancy heads sold for \$5.05 and \$5.10. Light hogs and thick fat sold for 4tc per lb. Stags are dull at from 20 to 21c, and sows for breeding fetch 3c to 3tc per lb.

The receipts are more liberal, and with fine weather, such as experienced the past day or two, the deliveries should show a good increase soon. The market is unchanged at 10c for unwashed and 16c for washed.

Tag carefully, and should you find any with diarrhoea from stomach worms, give remedy at once. It will not pay to try to fatten market, as in any other business, re-
