### DOMINION ALLIANCE APPEAL.

#### A Call for Organization.

The Executive of the Dominion Alliance met in the office of Secretary Spence on Saturday afternoon, when there was a large attendance. It was decided to issue the following appeal to the public:

To all friends of Temperance in Canada:

The Plebiscite Bill has been passed by Parliament. The money for the expense of voting has been appropriated. It is now certain that early in the coming autumn the electors of Canada will be asked to vote "yes" or "no" on the question of the total prohibition of the liquor traffic for beverage purposes.

This contest will be one of terrible intensity, nothing like it has ever taken place in the history of our cause. The liquor traffic realize the situation and will fight it as they never fought before. The very life of this grasping and powerful evil is at stake. To meet it we must be earnest, united and organized.

We cannot win without personal sacrifice. We must be ready to give time, money and energy to the fight. Organization must be perfected, literature must be circulated, meetings must be held. Every voter must be personally canvassed.

We wish the young couple much pleasure in life.

Miss M. J. McLeod, of S. Line, Glenelg, has an attack of appendicitis. We hope under Dr. Jamieson's care she may soon recover. We hear that no operation will be necessary.

During the last week or 10 days a number of the rat-payers of Artemesia, and probably a few from Glenelg, were engaged in building an Agricultural Hall in this village, and they expect to have it completed the end of this week. Pres. McCormick, Dep. Reeve McMillan and other leading men are in charge.

Death ended the earthly career of Mr. Waite on the 3rd inst., at the age of about 81 years. Mr. Waite was a sufferer more or less for the last five or six years with paralysis. About six weeks ago he became totally paralyzed and lived for nearly 40 days without food. He partook of a spoonful of water now and then, which was his chief nourishment during his illness. Mr. Waite came to Priceville in 1860, and the house he used for a blacksmith shop stood exactly where the fine Presbyterian manse is erected. By strict attention to business Mr. Waite soon began to accumulate largely from the results of his labor and at the time of his death he was worth upwards of twenty thousand dollars. Since the death of his wife last fall he made his home with his son-in-law, Mr. John McArthur. He leaves one son, James, now in the Northwest, and two daughters, Mrs. Jno McArthur and Mrs. J. A. Matheson, (Bell.) Mr. Waite was a regular attendant at ordinances until infirmities of recent years disabled him from getting far from his dwelling. He was

buried in this village on the 6th inst., a large body of sympathizers following the remains to the last resting place. Rev. Mr. Matheson preached the funeral sermon at the house and conducted the burial service at the grave.

Miss Webster, a young lady who accompanied Mrs. (Rev) Matheson at the time of moving to Priceville, is engaged teaching music. She has 30 or 40 of the youth of this locality learning the rudiments of music. Miss Webster is a first class musician and teacher.

Mr. D. McCormick is attending the quarter sessions at Owen Sound this week.

Mrs. Neil McDonald of Fairwell enjoyed herself in our town and was the guest of Mrs. Dag. McCormack the most of last week. She took in the sacrament on Sunday.

Rev. Mr. Darroch holds weekly prayer-meetings on the South Line and they are generally well attended.

A Mr. Hamby, from Nobleton, King Ip. rode on his wheel from there to Bob Fishers, South Line, in 10 hours. The Sacrament was dispensed in Gaelic in the Presbyterian church last Sabbath. Quite a number of the Highland race were out to listen to a good sermon in their native tongue. Next Sabbath the communion will be dispensed in the English tongue. Preaching on Friday at 2.30 p. m., and on Sunday at 11 a. m.

Miss Sarah McIntyre and her brother Norman are enjoying a week's holiday in Bruce Co. Miss McIntyre is one of the delegates to the Baptist Convention held in Paisley this week. Also Messrs. John and Archie McLean, South Line, Artemesia, are delegates.

## Live Stock Markets.

### TORONTO.

Yesterday and to-day the receipts at the Western Cattle Yards were 128 carloads, including 200 sheep and lambs, 50 calves, 2,000 hogs, and the usual run of milk cows and springers. Trade was active, and prices were slightly firmer for choice cattle. There was quite a bit of buying for export via Halifax to Barbadoes.

Export Cattle—The demand was brisker and prices held firm at from 4c to 4 1/2c per lb.

Butchers' Cattle—These cattle found a better demand and prices were slightly firmer at from \$3.75 to \$4.30 per cwt, the latter for choice stuff for quick killing. There were quite a few sales at 4 1/2c common to medium cattle sold for from 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c. The quality of the cattle was generally good and buyers and sellers did not haggle much over the prices.

Bulls—Trade quiet in this line at from \$3.40 to \$3.60 per cwt for shippers. Feeding bulls quiet at about 3c.

Stockers and Feeders—Quiet. Buffalo men were operating not quite so freely and prices ruled from \$3.30 to \$3.85 per cwt. Feeders fetch from 3 1/2c to 4 1/2c per lb.

Sheep and Lambs—Steady. Export sheep found a slightly improved inquiry as a result of the demand for Barbadoes. Prices rule from 2 1/2c per lb for bucks up to 3c to 3 1/2c per lb for ewes and wethers. Yearlings are steady at from 4 1/2c to 5 1/2c per lb. Spring lambs fetch \$3.50 to \$4.25 each.

Calves—There was a fair run and all sold at firm prices. Choice to fancy veals sell for from \$7 to \$8 each but the general run of prices is from \$3 to \$6 per head.

Milk Cows and Springers—Not many offered and all sold at firm prices from \$25 to \$45 each. Choice cows are wanted.

Hogs—Firm. Choice sangers are selling at from \$5.15 to \$5.20. Too many light hogs are coming forward. Prices for light and thick fat hogs rule from \$4.70 to \$4.75 per cwt. Sows for breeding sell for 3c to 3 1/2c and stags from 2c to 2 1/2c.

But breeders ought not to be discouraged. It costs no more really to raise good beef than tough. Much of the article put upon the market is so difficult to chew that a good many people have abandoned the use of steaks and taken to eating mutton chops. This state of things is directly the fault of the beef raiser. There is no reason why the flesh of every beef should not be sweet, juicy and tender. So it will be when beef producers understand their business.
