LIVE STOCK Points.

It is said that want of work has deprived many laboring men and their families of money to buy beef as food, and that the beef market is depressed in consequence. All the same, however, the dealers keep the price as high as it was when there was more demand for it. The unfortunate consumers never get any benefit from low prices. But breeders ought not to be discouraged. It costs no more really to raise good beef than tough. Much of the article put upon the market is so difficult to chew that a good many people have abandoned the use of steaks and taken to eating mutton chops. This state of things is directly the fault of the beef raiser. There is no reason why the flesh of every beef sold should not be sweet, juicy and tender. So it will be when beef producers understand their business.
