Insect enemies also are more numerous than usual this year. Apples, with the exception of the Spy, have set well, and where properly cared for there is promise of a good crop. In spraying apple trees to check or prevent the spot, use the Bordeaux mixture, made as follows:

BORDEAUX MIXTURE. Copper Sulphate 4 pounds. Lime (fresh)......4 pounds.
