### COUNTY COUNCIL.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

All the members present. Communications from various sources were referred to their various committees. The tenor of these appear in the reports.

Mr. Binnie presented and read Report No. 1 of Finance Committee which dealt with the following matters, and made the recommendations in each case as stated: It recommended payment of the accounts referred to them as follows: T. R. Meir, for rubber stamp for Auditors, 58c; County Clerk's postage account, \$7.50; R. Breckenridge & Son, for funeral expenses of A. Sheffield, an indigent, \$7.50. It recommended the granting of a renewal of the free pedlar's license to Edward Fitzgerald, a cripple; that the reports of North and South Grey Farmers' Institutes be filed; also that the circular from the Crown Lands department re Survey Act amendment be filed; it also dealt with the equalization of the County assessment for 1899, placing the equalized assessment of the various municipalities as follows:

The applications for grants which had been considered by the Committees were dealt with as follows: A grant of \$75 was made to the Children's Aid Society of Owen Sound and county of Grey; the application of Col. Telford for a grant to the 31st Battalion, and of the Poultry and Pet Stock Association, of Owen Sound, were refused; grants of \$25 each were recommended to the Farmers' Institutes of each riding and of \$25 each to the Teachers' Institutes of south west and east Grey.

Clause 1 of the report of Special committee dealt with the question of where-in lay the authority to make purchases of the jail supplies; clause 2—with the articles which may be advantageously purchased by tender; clause 3—recommended that supplies be advertised for by the county clerk instead of by the clerk of the peace, as formerly; clause 4—recommended that tenders be submitted to and awarded by a committee composed of the warden, sheriff and county clerk, and that the clerk report the results to the county council; clause 5—recommended that the food and ice supply, and the making of repairs and improvements to the county buildings and grounds be left in the hands of the County Property committee; clause 6—that the procuring of medical supplies shall be on the order of the jail surgeon. The remainder of the report explained how the criminal justice and judicial accounts of the county are audited, and recommended the appointment of a Standing committee on criminal justice accounts, its report to be referred to the council, so that the council may be made fully acquainted with the expenditures in detail, and so get information, with which they have not heretofore been furnished. This report was full of interest to the county council, and was, without doubt, one of the most interesting yet presented to the council, reflecting the highest credit on the ability of the committee, and particularly upon the chairman, Mr. McDonald.

On motion council adjourned till ten o'clock Thursday morning.

THURSDAY MORNING.

Council met, Warden in the chair, members all present.

Warden read application from Owen Sound General and Marine Hospital for a grant of \$300. Jas. McLaughlin, the vice-president of the hospital board being present, he addressed the council in support of the grant. The Secretary of the Central Agricultural Society, Walsker's Falls, asked by letter for a grant of \$75 for that society. These applications were referred to the Finance committee.

Mr. Gordon presented report No. 1 of Road and Bridge committee. This report dealt with the application of Jonathan Hickling and others with reference to the opening up of the town line between Osprey and Artemesia townships. The clerk was instructed to notify the councils of the townships interested to give the petitioners relief as speedily as possible. A similar matter between Artemesia and Euphrasia was dealt with in clause two of this report. The county clerk was directed to call the attention of the councils interested to their statutory position in reference to this matter and in the event of their failing in their duty, the warden and G. A. Brown were appointed a committee on behalf of the county council to inquire into and adjust the matter. Clause three appointed Messrs. Binnie and McKinnon a special committee to look after the necessity of the building of a new bridge on the county line of Grey and Bruce opposite the township of Bentinck.

Mr. McDonald presented report No. 1 of County Property committee. This report dealt principally with the payment of several accounts for repairs, &c. to county buildings. They were ordered to be paid. The chairman was instructed to advertise for a supply of stone for jail yard operators. It also instructed a special committee to see about cost of a new roof for court house, to report next session.

Mr. Sing presented report No. 1 of printing committee, which recommended payment of accounts of Jas. H. Little \$23.24; J. H. Rutherford \$2.00; Alex. Sunter \$1.50; H. E. Glendinning \$3.; SUN Printing Co. \$7.75.

Mr. Totten presented report of special committee having reference to the passing of a bylaw to confirm a bylaw of Township of Keppel.

Bylaw to appoint a trustee to Collegiate Institute; to confirm the equalized assessment of the county; also to confirm bylaw No. 15 of 1897 of Keppel tp., were severally introduced, and put through their preliminary stages, after which the council adjourned till 2 p. m.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON.

2 p. m.—Mr. Binnie presented report No. 2 of Finance committee, and on motion it was adopted. It recommended a refund of License fee paid by the late James Galbreath as auctioneer; also that the sum of \$200 be granted to the General and Marine hospital. It recommended the granting of \$200 to each of the District Agricultural societies of the county, but declined to recommend a grant to the Walter's Falls Central society.

Mr. Bishop presented report No. 1 of Education committee, which was adopted. It recommended the filing of the reports of South, West and East Grey Inspectors of schools, and that the vacancy on the Owen Sound Board of Education occasioned by the death of Geo. Inglis Esq., be filled by the council.

A long discussion re the refusal of the volunteer grant being ably championed by Col. Telford, Mr. McDonald, Mr. Quance, Mr. Bishop, and opposed by Mr. Allan, Mr. McColman and others. A motion for a grant of \$500 instead of \$1000 failed to pass. Nothing of the jingo spirit in Co. Grey council! Neither powder nor poultry gets a grant this year.

Frid-y and Saturday's work will appear in a future issue.

### EGREMONT COUNCIL.

A special meeting of Council was held in the forenoon of June 18th, to consider ways and means of raising the necessary funds to meet our Railway Debentures falling due August 1st, 1898.

Mr. McNuis absent.

Minutes of previous meeting read and adopted.

McQueen—Hunter—That the form of petition drafted by the Clerk respecting the Railway debt, together with the form of Debentures and By-law appended there to be adopted, and handed over to the delegate to be appointed, for consent and approval of His Honor the Lieutenant Governor in Council. Carried.

Hunter—McQueen—That the Reeve and Treas. be appointed delegates to present a petition to the Lieutenant Governor in Council asking leave to issue debentures for the sum of \$9,000 to meet liabilities on Railway By-law due Aug. 1st 1898. Carried.

McQueen—Hunter—That the Clerk notify all parties indebted to this municipality by way of Mortgage, that such accounts must be paid by July 16th, 1898. Carried.

Council adjourned until Monday June 27th, as per motion from last regular session. D. Allair, Clerk.

### Live Stock Markets.

TORONTO.

Receipts at the Western Cattle Yards to-day were not so heavy as they have been and prices remained firm. There were about 52 carloads of stuff in all told including 1,400 hogs and 100 sheep and lambs. Some Manitoba cattle are expected to be moved out in about a couple of weeks.

Export Cattle—There was a steady demand and the offerings were light. Some of the fancy cattle touched \$4.80 per cwt, with the ruling figures for the best cattle being from \$4.50 to \$4.75 per cwt. Bulls sold for from \$3.40 to \$4 per cwt, as to quality and weight, and butchers' bulls brought 3 to 3 1/2c per lb.

Butchers' Cattle—Really choice cattle were in light offer and the market was a firm one. Some of the best cattle for immediate killing sold for from \$4.40 to \$4.50 per cwt, but the general run of prices was from \$3.50 to \$4.25 and \$4.30 per cwt. Common cattle and cows sold for from \$3.25 to \$3.50 per cwt. Everything was sold early.

Stockers and Feeders—Light stockers were quoted at from \$3.40 to \$3.90 per cwt, some touching \$4. Feeders brought \$3.75 to \$4.25 per cwt, for those weighing from 1,000 to 1,050 lbs each.

Sheep and Lambs—There was a slightly weaker feeling in this line. Spring lambs sold for from \$2.50 to \$4 each, there being very few at the latter figure. Sheep both butchers' and export sell for from \$3 to \$3.30 per cwt. Bucks are dull at \$2.75.

Calves—There are plenty in for the demand and the tone is rather weak. The ruling figures are from \$3 to \$7 each, the latter for choice veals. Common calves sell as low as \$2.

Milch Cows and Springers—Offerings were light and the market firm. Fancy newly-calved cows sell for \$45 to \$46 each, with the ruling figures from \$25 to \$40 per head.

Hogs—There is practically no change to record in this line, although the feeling is slightly firmer. Choice selections of bacon hogs bring from \$5.15 to \$5.20, other rough hogs are dull at \$2 to \$2.25. Too many corn-fed hogs from the west are coming forward, and Mr. Harris has instructions from the packers to refuse to buy them.
