Gigantic Census-Taking Scheme Evolved-Prospects that It Will be Carried Ou Successfully.

A gigantic scheme has been evolved for numbering the people of the earth It is the intention to select a day the year 1900, and have an army o census takers start out on that particular day in every quarter of the globe and count the heads of every person upon whom the sun rises. The Teports are all to be sent in to a central establishment at Berne, and so the greatest census taking on record will be completed by the actual counting of the people of the world.

Some say that the scheme is not possible of accomplishment, but it will be done, and no effort will be left unmade and no expense spared to have the returns accurate.

To guide them in their task, the census-takers will have the estimated population made by John Bartholomew, F.R.G.S., of Edinburgh, who has figured out that in round numbers the population of the world is 1,440,650,000, divided as follows: Indo-Germanic or ainain, 630,000,000; negro and Bantu, Malay and Polynesian, 35,000,000 and Crime is Swiftly Puntshed-No One Carries far too low. One thousand pounds of American Indian, 15,000,000.


