Every friend of Prohibition should urge every man to vote even if they vote 'No.' We want no snap verdict. Let the truth be known. Let it be seen how many are bold enough to say by their vote that they will be responsible for the iniquity of a government deriving a revenue from a degrading traffic.

The liquor party is issuing literature as they have a right to do, but, if our readers get hold of it we say "Think it out." On one hand the farmer is to be ruined by the loss of a market, on the other the market will be all right, for the quantity of whiskey sold will not be reduced.

The eyes of moral reformers in English speaking countries are watching this experiment with hopeful anxiety. Canadians have lately been setting the pace for the Empire in several ways.

There are voters we are told, who will tamely stay at home: drink never harmed them. On the other hand, men on whom drink has fastened its chains, will go out and vote 'Yes' with a feverish desire that voters not entangled, would assist them to overthrow their enemy.
