You are invited to share in the rare delight and profit that will assuredly mark this First United Lutheran Summer School of Canada held under the direction of our Women's Missionary Societies and two Ontario Synods. It presents a splendid opportunity of gaining a vision of the world-wide mission and work of our beloved church, for studying missions and missionary methods and other branches of our local Church work, and for meeting in delightful fellowship leaders, missionaries and workers in all branches of our Church's activities.

PLACE OF MEETING.

The Summer School will be held at our College and Seminary in the pretty town of Waterloo, Ont. This institution which we all helped to found should prove an almost irresistible attraction in itself, standing as it does on one of the highest, breeziest and most healthful spots in Western Ontario, affording a beautiful view of one of the wealthiest and most progressive farming sections and one of the most enterprising towns and cities in the Province. This institution of ours

furnishes an ideal place for such a gathering.

AIM OF THE SCHOOL.

The aim of our Summer School is to provide training for leadership in all branches of our Church's work, to inspire to larger and more effective service, to discuss the best methods of promoting the work of our Church at home and in general, and to lead all to relate their lives definitely to the plan and purpose of God.

A DELIGHTFUL OUTING.

Summer Schools are not all work and no play. We plan to give most of our lectures in the mornings and our Platform Talks in the evening, with the afternoons left open, as far as possible, for rest and recreation. Just a few steps from the campus of the Seminary is Waterloo's famous natural park with athletic grounds for baseball, tennis, etc., and beautiful Silver Lake where canoes are available. There will also possibly be hikes, automobile excursions to various points, a picnic, etc. The Summer School thus makes possible a most enjoyable summer outing.

BOARDING ACCOMMODATION.

All delegates from a distance will room and board right at the Seminary as one large family. All will take their meals together in the spacious dining room and thus become thoroughly acquainted with each other.

THE PROGRAM

I. THE UNITED CHURCH.

The Rev. F. H. Knubel, D.D., of New York City, the first President of our new United Lutheran Church in America, to which we belong, will lecture on this subject. It ought to be worth while coming to the Summer School just to meet and hear him. He is the official head of about 800,000 confirmed Lutherans.

II. MINISTERIAL CONFERENCE.

Dr. Knubel wishes to meet all United Church pastors of Ontario in Conference on June 27. No pastor should miss this. It is important.

III. SUNDAY SCHOOL WORK.

We have been very fortunate in being able to secure the Rev. J. R. E. Hunt, of Chicago, Ill., to present three lectures on this subject. Rev. Hunt is the author of the "Lutheran Sunday School Handbook," "Lutheran Home Missions," etc., etc. He is a thoroughly conservative but wide-awake Lutheran with a most optimistic faith in the future of our Church on this Continent. You'll be delighted to make his acquaintance.

IV. YOUNG PEOPLE'S WORK.

It is doubtful whether a more capable person could be found in Canada to present the work of our Canadian Lutheran young people than the Rev. H. A. Sperling, Ph.D., of Kitchener, Ont. Dr. Sperling is well known to most of our Luther Leaguers and we feel sure that none of them will

wish to miss his presentation of this subject.

V. LUTHERAN BROTHERHOOD.

Perhaps for the first time our Canadian Lutheran men will have the opportunity of listening to a lecturer on their work in the Church who is an expert in this line. The Rev. S. S. Waltz, D.D., of Chicago, Ill., is the Executive Secretary of the Lutheran Brotherhood of America. His whole time is given to men's work. He has a message for you.

VI. CANADIAN HOME MISSIONS.

The Rev. E. Hoffmann, D.D., of Toronto, who will present this subject, is not alone acquainted with the Home Mission Work of our Church as it has been carried on in both languages in Ontario, but, as President of the Board for a number of years, he is just as well acquainted with the work carried on in that great Mission Field of the Canadian North West. No other person is so well acquainted with the whole field of Canadian Home Missions as Dr. Hoffmann.

VII. GENERAL HOME MISSIONS.

From that great Lutheran Home Mission field of Chicago, Ill. we are bringing a real expert in this work, the Rev. Luther Hogshead, B.D. Rev. Hogshead has spent practically his entire ministry in Home Mission work and is thoroughly acquainted with his subject from A to Z. As Western District Superintendent of Home Missions of the former General Council he had charge of a tremendous Home Mission Field which gave him an experience in this work such as few men have enjoyed.

VIII. INNER MISSIONS.

Comparatively few of our members know what we mean by Inner Missions or they have a somewhat confused idea. We'd like to tell you here what it means, but the Rev. Walter Krumwiede of Buffalo, N.Y., who is Supt. of our Inner Mission work of that city, and who will present this subject, is going to do that and he will be able to do it so much better. This is one of the most interesting and, at the present time, most important branches of our Church work and Rev. Krumwiede knows just how to present it.

IX. FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We read of Foreign Missions and our pastors preach Missionary Sermons of course, but wouldn't you rather meet a person who has actually been on the field and worked at Foreign Missions? Here is your opportunity. The Rev. R. M. Dunkelberger, M.A., has spent ten years of his life in the service of his Lord and Master in our Mission Field at Guntur, India. He will not only tell you just what you've always been wanting to know about this work, but he will show actual photographic slides of his work as it is carried on in far away India. Don't miss meeting and hearing Rev. Dunkelberger.

X. INTER-CHURCH MOVEMENTS.

The Rev. C. H. Little, D.D., will discuss our Church's attitude towards the other denominations and show why we take the stand that we do towards the many Unionistic and Inter-Church Movements so prevalent in our day. All who know Dr. Little, know also that this subject in his hands will be very ably handled. It will be of interest to all.

NOTE.

In the subjects mentioned above there will be courses of three lectures each on Sunday School Work, Home Missions, Foreign Missions and the Lutheran Brotherhood Work. There will be two lectures on Inner Missions and one on each of the other subjects.

EXTRAS.

In addition to the regular feast of good things outlined, there will be delightful Life Talks on the campus preceding the evening lectures. There will also be special musical features in the evenings. Those attending the School will also have opportunities of meeting the speakers personally and as all will dine together there will be such a bond of mutual interest welded as has never existed before.

EXPENSES.

The splendid accommodation provided by the authorities of our Seminary and College is offered at a very reasonable rate. The charge for board and room for each delegate for the three days of the School will be three dollars (\$3.00). Single meals, thirty-five cents (35c).

Nearly all rooms are furnished with two single beds. Where desired, delegates should indicate choice of room-mate in

forwarding application.

A registration fee of one dollar (\$1.00) is required of each delegate to cover the expenses incurred in conducting the School. Rooms cannot be reserved until this fee is paid. Thus four dollars (\$4.00) covers everything.

Delegates are requested to bring their
