Grads to "bring it all back home"
for WLU Homecoming '84, Sept. 27-29

There will be something for the intellect and some things just for fun when graduates of Wilfrid Laurier University return to campus for Homecoming '84, Sept. 27-29, sponsored by the WLU Alumni Association under the theme, Bringing it all back home.

Among the events are the annual Homecoming parade, with a marching band and 20 floats at noon Sept. 29, and the annual Homecoming football game that afternoon at 2 p.m., this year between Laurier and York Yeomen at Seagram Stadium.

The weekend begins with a reception and dinner for social work graduates Sept. 27, followed at 8 p.m. by the 11th annual Easton-McCarney Lecture, a free event open to the public.

The speaker, Dr. Tony Clark of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, will discuss Social Justice and the Economic Order, a theme suggested by the first visit of a Pope to Canada.

On Sept. 28 the second annual Alumni College will feature two parallel sessions, one on the moral and ethical perspectives of social work practice and the second, presented by the Laurier Institute for Business and Economics, on the management of technology. These sessions are open to Laurier graduates.

The first annual Alumni soccer game Sept. 28 at 6:30 p.m. in Budd Park will see returning soccer alumni facing this year's varsity squad. All 22 soccer team graduates are returning, including all-Canadians Paul Scholz and Scott Fraser.

On Sept. 29 fun activities predominate, beginning with the second annual WLU Alumni 10 km. road race, with pre-registration required at the university's athletic complex. The event is open to all.

All returning graduates are invited to attend the Alumni Association's general meeting and champagne brunch Sept. 29 before joining those watching the parade.

The parade will proceed from the athletic complex at University and King streets, Waterloo, along University to Erb street, on Erb to Weber street, and then back to campus for a judging of the floats and presentation of prizes.

A number of class reunions will highlight activities that evening. The Class of '74 will hold its 10th anniversary reception and dinner, and the Class of '69 will mark its 15th anniversary. The Class of '59, marking its 25th anniversary, will have the Classes of '58 and '60 as guests.
