Changing culture in African people topic for final Laurier lecture

Marjorie Shostak, a faculty member at Emory University in Atlanta, will discuss the changing culture of the !Kung people of northwestern Botswana in a talk March 17 at Wilfrid Laurier University.

She will speak at 8 p.m. in the arts building as the final speaker in this year's Laurier lecture series, which has had the general topic, endangered worlds.

Her topic is Vulnerability and Adaptation: Two !Kung women look at their changing culture.

Shostak is an author, photographer and film-maker, and has published extensively. Her latest work is The Paleolithic Prescription.
