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Two-day military history conference looks at wide range of topics

The 7th Military History Colloquium, presented by The Laurier Centre for Military Strategic and Disarmament Studies on May 10 and 11, offers a wide range of offerings for people interested in international relations, military history, and peacekeeping issues.

Topics range from World War II bombing policies to the development of the United Nations, from the future of nuclear disarmament to combat motivation, from the role of women in Canada's military to the Canadian experience in the Gulf War and Native Canadian recruitment in World War II.

Participants include Canadian academics and military officers.

The cost for the full two days is \$45 (\$30 for students) which includes registration, coffee, two lunches, and a banquet dinner. There is no charge to attend individual sessions. All sessions take place in the South Lecture Hall (Room 1002) of the WLU science building, which is at the corner of King and Bricker streets.
