WATERLOO – While their 2,000 counterparts at Wilfrid Laurier University's main campus run through the annual Orientation Week events, some of the nearly 100 students in Laurier Brantford's inaugural class will participate in an orientation of their own.

From Septemer 9 to 11 Laurier Brantford students will receive a campus tour, find out about student resources, discover how to get involved and learn how to cope with classes, essays and exams. Orientation also includes icebreaking activities and social events, which benefit the many Laurier Brantford students from outside the community.
