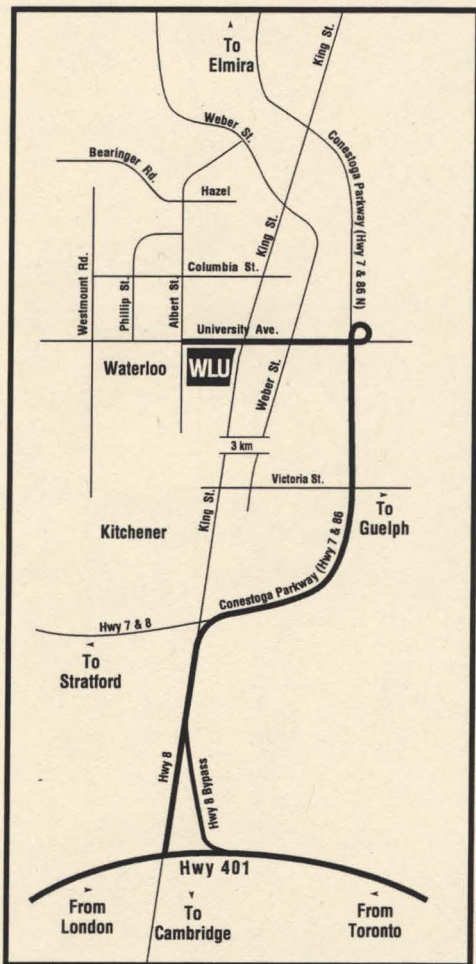

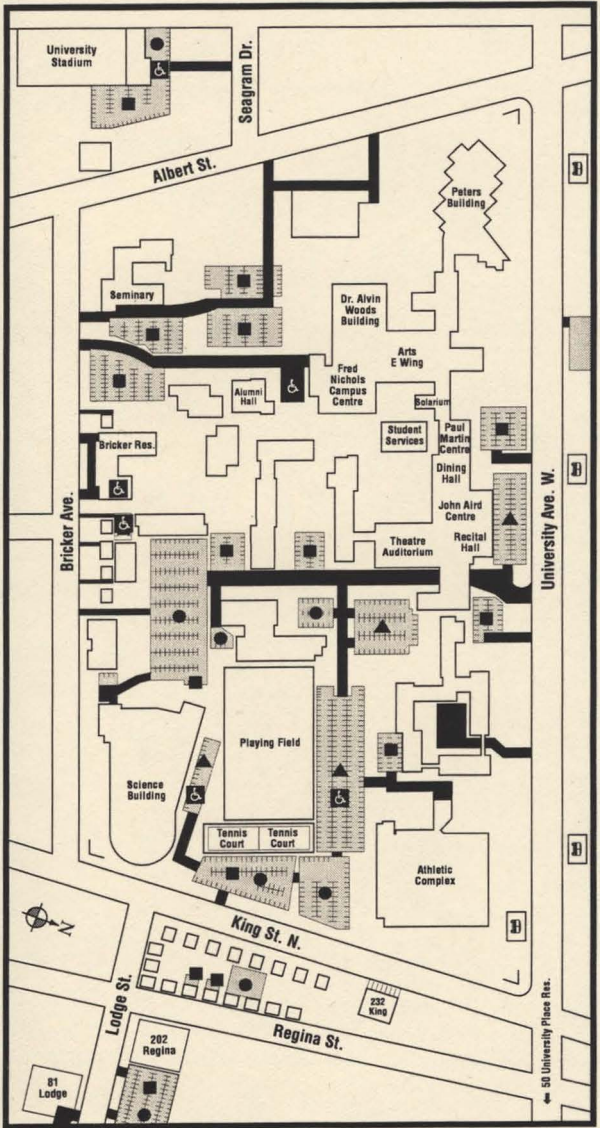


From Highway 401

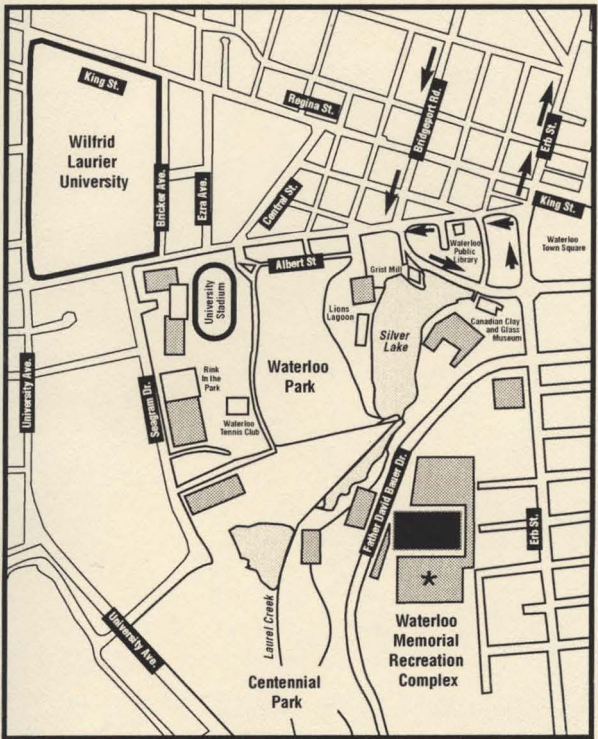
AREA MAP:
