Laurier hosts international workshop on federalism in Canada and the European Union

WATERLOO – Experts from Canadian and European universities will gather at Wilfrid Laurier University Oct. 28-29 as part of an international workshop on federalism in Canada and the European Union.

The workshop aims to highlight the decentralized characteristics of Canadian federalism, which could serve as a model for future European Union federalism.

"Europeans have commonly associated federalism with the centralized American federal state, and consequently tended to reject it as a guiding principle for further European integration," said Dr. Thomas O. Hueglin, workshop organizer and Laurier's 2009-2010 university research professor. "Canada may turn out to be a new model of federalism in a world of complex diversity. Some in the European Union have already taken notice."

Workshop presentations range from "Is the EU heading towards a federation?" by Lenka Rovna, Charles University, Prague to "Maintaining the federal balance: intergovernmental relations as 'the' or 'one' federal institution" by Grace Skogstad, University of Toronto.
