College to Fill Central Position

President Hagey announced to the alumni assembled at the reunion dinner, that formal application for a degree-granting charter would be made this spring. Should the provincial government accept the appli-cation (and there's little reason to think that it won't), then the University of Wat-erloo will first open its doors next Septem-

The new university will have as its arts college, the existing Waterloo College, parent and founding institution of the Associate Faculties and university. Unlike most of its sister institutions, the University of Waterloo will have no university college. The functions of such a college will be fulfilled by Waterloo College.

St. Jerome's College to Join

St. Jerome's College, also of the Twin Cities, will probably break its affiliation with the University of Ottawa in order to join with the University of Waterloo. Eventually this college will relocate on the new 200-acre campus purchased last year by the Associate Faculties.

\$434 MILLION SOUGHT BY COLLEGE

Details of a campaign to raise \$4,750,000 for Waterloo College Associate Faculties were written in a speech by J. G. Brown to be presented at today's meeting of K-W Rotary Club.

However, Mr. Brown died on Nov. 11, but Rotarians still heard his talk today. It was read by J. G. Hagey, college president.

The talk dealt primarily with the need to raise \$750,000 by public subscription in Waterloo County to meet costs involved in the transition of the college into a university with degree-granting privileges.

Don't Cover Land

Provincial and federal grants do not cover land purchases, site development or library book costs. These will cost an estimated \$425,000.

The total for all these buildings and equipment is set at \$4,750,000.

The Waterloo College Associate Faculties hopes \$3,000,000 in grants will be available for building construction when the additional buildings are needed.

Of the remaining \$1,750,000, the Canada Council will provide \$250,000 and \$1,500,000 is expected to be raised from outside Waterloo County.

General chairman of the fund - called the co-operative education fund - is Ira G. Needles, chairman of the board of governors of the Associate Faculties.
