

THE WOMEN'S AUXILIARY OF WATERLOO LUTHERAN UNIVERSITY

The Women's Auxiliary of W.L.U. held their annual meeting on Wednesday, September 26, 1973 in the Theatre Auditorium of the University, commencing at 10.00 a.m.

The Rev. Senoelo Mothupi, a South African studying at the Seminary, conducted the devotions and chose as his theme the verse from Luke 12:42 "Who then is the faithful and wise steward, whom his master will set over his household." He said this question has been asked from the beginning of time and was also asked of the Lutheran community in 1913 when a group of faithful women took over the household of Waterloo Lutheran Seminary. This group has developed into a large Auxiliary which has helped in the growth of the Seminary and University to what it is today. The accompanist for the hymn singing was Miss Carol Raymond.

Mrs. Harold Vogt welcomed the members of the Auxiliary, and announced that the Executive had appointed her as president to complete Mrs. Chapman's term of office. Mrs. Chapman resigned as president in August to take an administrative post in a school in Trinidad.

Mrs. Vogt called on Dr. Frank Peters who welcomed the members to the University. He spoke of the coming change in name from Waterloo Lutheran University to Wilfrid Laurier University on November 1. He looked forward to many years of profitable relationship, and asked for our continued prayer support. He hoped that the Auxiliary would continue to hold their meetings at the University.

Dr. Delton Glebe, Dean of the Seminary, brought greetings. He mentioned that there are 60 full-time and part-time students studying at the Seminary and 6 faculty teachers who lecture to 600 University students as well as Seminary students. He said that administrative work and leadership was no push-over, but one of the resources which uplifts is the Auxiliary. The work of the Auxiliary and the moral support it gives makes it materially possible for the church to proceed.

Dr. Glebe then introduced the family of Pastor Mothupi - Mrs. Helen Mothupi and their four children. The Lutheran World Federation and the Eastern Canada Synod provided funds to bring the Mothupi family to Canada for Pastor Mothupi's final year at the Seminary. Funds from this source are limited and Dr. Glebe asked the ladies to go to their home churches and speak of the needs of this family, and suggested that if friends or members of a congregation could get together and provide "blocks" of \$50. and send them to Waterloo Lutheran Seminary marked "Senoelo Mothupi Fund", this would make it possible for this family to stay in Canada until Pastor Mothupi finishes his final school year next May.

Dr. Glebe said he hoped that the Auxiliary would see their way clear to continue sending quilts to be used in the dormitories on a carefully selected basis. He spoke of the spirit of co-operation the Seminary has enjoyed with the University - University students take courses in the Seminary - Seminary professors teach in the University - and hoped this sharing would continue.

Mrs. Chapman's annual report was read by Mrs. Vogt. Mrs. Chapman remarked that the Auxiliary "has given sixty years of dedication and sincere concern and the challenge is still here. Wherever our path leads, there will always be young people appreciating our efforts." Seven certificates were presented to graduating seminarians at their dinner in the spring, and also the Executive was pleased to arrange for a meeting on campus of the Lutheran Church Women of Trinity Lutheran Church, New Hamburg.

The Secretary, Mrs. Moore, read a resume of the minutes of the 1972 annual meeting.

Mrs. A. H. Schmetzer, Treasurer, presented the financial report for the period from July 1, 1972 to June 30, 1973:

This report with audit was accepted as printed. Since the audit, \$161. has been received by the Treasurer.

The Promotion Chairman, Mrs. Ernest Schaefer, in her report, mentioned that there had been four mailings to the contact women during the 1972-1973 year. She wanted the Auxiliary also to be aware of the fact that, all through the years, the facilities of the printing and mailing room of the University have been generously at our disposal and we have been assured that this will continue.

Mrs. Paul Weber directed the members' attention to the quilt report and asked that when sending quilts, names and addresses of the donors should be included and they be sent to her address at 312 Algonquin Drive, Waterloo.

Mrs. William Gillespie brought greetings from Mrs. Fred Stahlschmidt, the first president of the Auxiliary, who was not well enough to attend. Mrs. Gillespie stated that in the past year we had received three names for the Golden Book of Honour - Dr. Lloyd Schaus, Dr. John Reble and Miss Olive Tyson; and three names for the Memorial Book - Mrs. John Brill, Preston; Mrs. Violet Baetz, Neustadt; Mrs. Cynthia Kennard, Hamilton.

At this time, Mrs. Frank Hoddle, representing St. Peter's Lutheran Church Women, read a citation honouring Dr. John Reble to be placed in the Auxiliary's Golden Book of Honour. Dr. Reble served as President of the Eastern Canada Synod for 27 years, including when the Auxiliary was formed.

It was recommended by the Executive Committee that we become an Auxiliary to Waterloo Lutheran Seminary. This recommendation was adopted unanimously by a standing vote.

224 persons responded to the roll call representing 43 congregations.

Mrs. Fred Herbst, Chairman of the Project Committee, presented the following projects for the 1973-74 year, which were approved:

The offering totalled \$282, and will be directed to the "Senoelo Mothupi Fund".

Past Presidents Mrs. William Gillespie, Mrs. C. H. Doerr, Mrs. O.O. Ireland, Mrs. H. C. Greb and Mrs. W. Hachborn, and President Mrs. H. Vogt took part in a candle-lighting ceremony celebrating the 60th Anniversary of the Auxiliary, while Mrs. William Machesney read "Glimpses from the Scrapbook" which was prepared by Mrs. Michael Binder. Following this, the members took part in a Thanksgiving Litany.

During the luncheon period, the contact women met with Mrs. Ernest Schaefer to discuss promotion in their congregations.

The afternoon session began with the introduction by Mrs. Harry Greb of our guest soloist, Mr. Alan MacLeod, whose accompanist was Mrs. Rosalyn Peper. An enjoyable half-hour was spent listening to Mr. MacLeod's selections from popular musicals.

The guest speaker, Sister Sheila Radtke of Pottstown, Pennsylvania, was introduced by Mrs. Earl Cook. Sister Sheila commenced by saying that she came to the W.L.U. Campus 23 years ago as a freshman as a result of a scholarship received from the Auxiliary, and reflected on her life since she left her home, and what influence the church, pastor and Auxiliaries such as ours have influenced her life and helped and encouraged her. She reminded us that all the people of the past are a part of what the University will become, but that change is the biggest part of life and that change holds specialness and beauty. She said that it scares us to undertake change alone but we are co-workers with God so "invite Him aboard! and be grateful for the challenge of today". Sister Sheila was thanked by Mrs. Glinz.

The meeting closed with Sister Florence Weicker giving the benediction.

Coffee was served at the rear of the auditorium.

Mr. Richard K. Taylor, Director of Information for W.L.U., conducted a tour of the new athletic centre and the Seminary.

I wish to offer my sincere thanks to my assistants on the executive for their ever-present support and enthusiasm and to them and all my friends in the Auxiliary, my best wishes for an ever better achievement in the years to come.
