WOMEN'S AUXILIARY OF WATERLOO LUTHERAN SEMINARY

The 1984 annual meeting of the Women's Auxiliary of Waterloo Lutheran Seminary was held at St. John's Lutheran Church, Waterloo, on Wednesday, Sept. 26, 1984.

The president, Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer, called the meeting to order at 10 a.m. in the church auditorium, welcoming all with a special welcome to Past Presidents who were in attendance.

Opening Devotions and greetings were extended by the Rev. Jack Dressler, Pastor of St. John's Lutheran Church.

Opening Hymn 495 - Lead on Thou King Eternal Scripture reading from Luke 16: vs. 10 states: "Whoever is faithful in small matters will be faithful in large ones."

Romans 12, vs. 4 and 5 states:

"We have many parts in one body, and all these parts have different functions. In the same way, though we are many, we are all joined to each other by different parts of one body."

Pastor Dressler continued that we never know the importance of the little things of life. The many little things are important to the big things of life. For instance, recently the world celebrated the 145th anniversary of the invention of the household match. A trivial incident now, but a very important event to light the path of science.

The Auxiliary's help has been important to all students, especially what seems little and small to us is of much importance to many. Co-operation and love are a partnership with the Lord.

Closing prayer was followed with the singing of
Hymn 377 - Lift High the Cross.

Greetings from the Seminary were brought by the new Dean, Dr. Richard Crossman; in August 1984 he was appointed Principal-Dean. He expressed his pleasure at being present and commented that he is reminded of the work of the Women's Auxiliary constantly at the Seminary.

BUSINESS SESSION

1. Report of the President. Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer, president reported that the Executive Board met 5 times to carry on the business of the Auxiliary.

At the Feb. 1984 meeting, the resignation of Mrs. Florence Baggett, for health reasons, was accepted with regret. This office of Assistant Promotion Committee Chairman is being filled by Mrs. Glen Doerbecker of St. James Lutheran Church, St. Jacobs.

BUSINESS SESSION

Report of the President --- cont'd.

The president expressed appreciation for the 18 quilts which will be distributed to the first year Seminarians in the next few weeks.

Since the quilt report was printed, the following were received: St. Matthews, Conestogo, 2 quilts;
Grace Lutheran, Oakville, 1 quilt.

Seven more quilts were brought to the meeting today from: St. Matthews, Hanover, 1 quilt; Reformation, Kitchener, 1 quilt; Trinity, New Hamburg, 1 quilt; St. James, North Easthope, 1 quilt; St. Luke's, Ridgeway, 1 quilt, (made by Mrs. Goos); Grace, Hamilton, 1 quilt; St. Peter's, Zurich, 1 quilt.

Quilts are now the only bedding required. It is to be hoped that the Auxiliary will continue its long tradition of providing quilts for the Seminarians.

Gift Certificates from Fortress Church Supply Store were presented in the spring to 8 Seminary graduates, and 3 part-time students. Letters of appreciation for these certificates, as well as for financial assistance, were on display in the Fellowship Hall.

A letter from Mr. Horace Braden, Director of Student Awards, was read, thanking the Auxiliary for providing a bursary for a student at Wilfrid Laurier University.

A gift of \$500. to the Auxiliary in memory of the 5th Auxiliary president, Mrs. Olive Musselman, given by her husband, was used to purchase the Wedding Banner on display in the chancel.

Last Spring the president had the privilege of serving on a committee which planned Dr. Glebe's retirement dinner, sponsored by the Seminary Board of Governors, at Bingeman Park on May 25th. A donation of \$50. on behalf of the Auxiliary was given towards the cost of the oil painting presented to Dr. Glebe.

On Sept. 16, the members of the Executive served refreshments to the Seminarians, their families and friends, following the first chapel service of the new academic year.

Thanks were expressed to all the contact women who sent in the names of all the Auxiliary members. The president reported a total of 1259 known Auxiliary members. This is 200 more than last year. It was recommended that the lists be continued to be sent in until we have a complete list of all Auxiliary members.

The president stated that her term of office ended with the 1984 annual meeting. She thanked the Executive for their kind support and co-operation, and all the members of the Auxiliary for being loyal and faithful members.

9. Proposed change in the Constitution.

A copy of the revised change of the constitution was mailed to all congregations in May 1984, to comply with the constitution which states that notice of change in the constitution must be made at least 60 days before the annual meeting. A two-thirds vote for the change in the constitution is required.

there were none who were opposed and none who
abstained from voting.

Attention was drawn by Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer, to the reverse side of the dinner programme, which contained a copy of a tribute to Dr. Glebe written by Pastor Roy Grosz, for the retirement dinner in May, 1984, at Bingeman Park.

Dr. Richard Crossman, in his words of tribute to Dr. Glebe, asked how anyone could successfully follow someone like Dr. Glebe, who seems to be possessed with a certain "twinkle" that always shines out so brightly in his dealings with the students.

Tribute to Dr. Glebe from Dr. Alvin Baetz, retired Pastor

Dr. Baetz began by telling that he was a school mate of Dr. Glebe and reminisced about early childhood memories. Even in those early years, Delton Glebe exhibited the qualities of a leader among his peers.

At the retirement dinner in May, one of the gifts he received was a painting, an autumn scene showing rocks, flowing water and a patch of clear sky, against a background of colored autumn leaves, which could very well define Delton's character -- he is firm as a rock in his faith, the moving water suggests no stagnation, the clear sky and the bright autumn colors signify a sunny disposition which radiates from the man at all times.

Mrs. Aileen Hiller made a presentation to Dr. Glebe on behalf of the Women's Auxiliary -- a parcel appropriately wrapped in purple and gold, the colors of the Seminary.

In her address she stated that all good wishes go with this gift -- a quilt with the Luther Rose Emblem beautifully sewn by the quilters of Mt. Zion Lutheran Church, which is Dr. Glebe's home church.

In his response Dr. Glebe confessed that this gift was a complete surprise to him. He praised the work of the Auxiliary and hoped the members would continue to provide quilts for the Seminarians in the years to come. He thanked everyone most sincerely for the lovely gift and said he and Mrs. Glebe would treasure it always. He also asked for the loyalty of the Auxiliary to the new Dean.

At the conclusion of his talk, the president Mrs. Dorothy Schaefer invited all to stand and join in the singing of "For he's a jolly good fellow".

After announcements were made, the Auxiliary's Dinner Programme to honour the retirement of Dr. Delton Glebe as Dean of Waterloo Lutheran Seminary, ended, with the singing of the Doxology.

AFTERNOON MEETING

MRS. JOANNA MALINA - Reminiscing about Clinical Training

Mrs. Malina took advantage of the clinical training offered at the K-W. Hospital. Beginning with group sessions, each one had to tell of childhood experiences as far back as could be remembered. She found this to be of great importance in her weeks of training.

She was assigned to the coronary and post-coronary unit and became more sensitive to their needs as they told of their values and priorities. She did not hesitate to pray with the patients who were facing an operation.

Mrs. Malina had to write reports of conversations with the patients and be judged by these reports. In the course of the program she had to convey a significant amount of patience and faith to the patients.

Pastoral care and counselling are vitally important to the patients, so the student must reach deep within herself for strength to pass on this feeling of caring.

Mrs. Ethel Gastmeier expressed the gratitude of the Auxiliary for this insight into Clinical Training.

GUEST SPEAKER - The Rev. J. Neil Alexander

In her introduction of the Rev. Alexander, Mrs. Isabel Dotzenroth told the Auxiliary he had been a parish pastor in the New Jersey Synod, prior to beginning graduate studies in preparation for Seminary teaching. He was ordained in the North Carolina Synod and has a Master of Music Degree, concentrating on Organ Performance and Choral Conducting.

The topic of the Rev. Alexander's talk was:
"The Role of Spiritual Formation in Theological Education"

The Rev. Alexander pointed out that The Lutheran Book of Worship is the book which we use for proper forms of worship.

The most accurate picture of what Lutherans believe is the Liturgy of the Ordination of Pastors, which requires that they be prepared, certified and examined. In the ordination of the new pastor, words like faithfulness and endurance are used with the prayer that he had been spiritually informed about the grace of God. We hope new pastors will also know obedience, service, discipline and worthiness.

Mrs. Patricia Pond thanked the Rev. Alexander for his informative words and said it is good to have him on the faculty at Waterloo Lutheran Seminary.
