Locating Waterloo From Highway 401

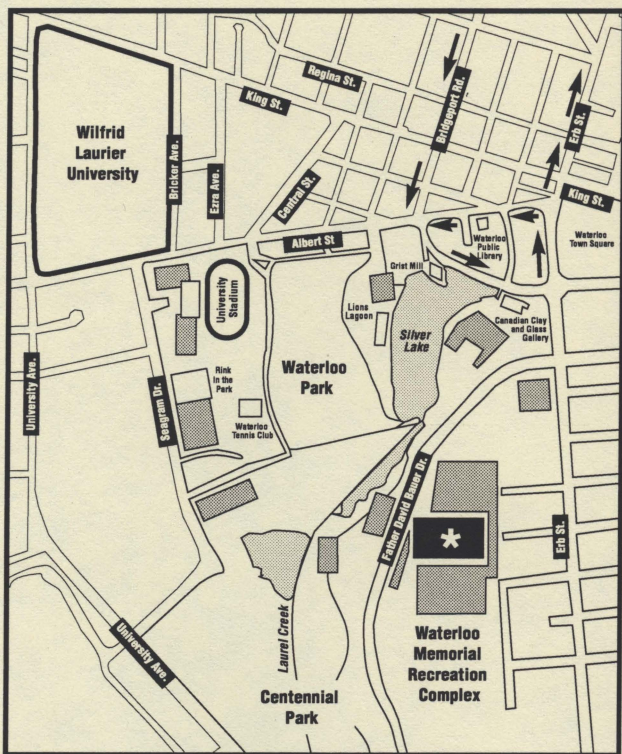

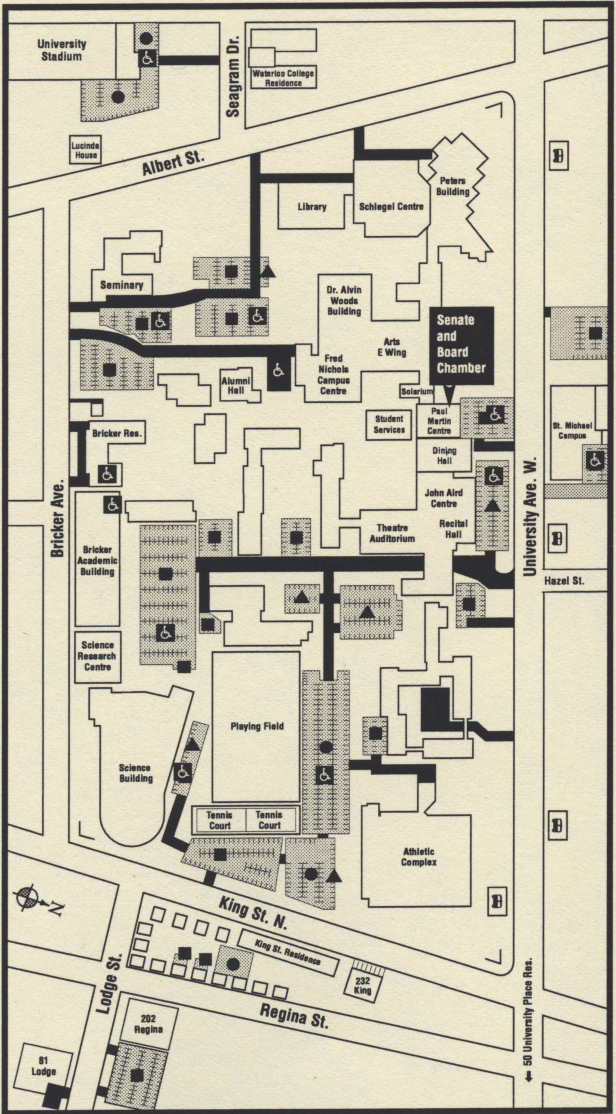
