PROGRAM

From 7.00 a.m. to 9.30 p.m the camp day is filled with activity — Camp Craft, Nature Study, Hobbies, Bible Study, Hikes, Games, Camp-Fire Programs.

Inter-City, Inter-Tent and Staff Competitions.

Visits to near-by Camps.

Special Classes for Non-swimmers.

Interest Groups in Music and Dramatics.

In both camps each tent will have an older boy or girl as leader. These young people are being secured from the various churches on the recommendation of their pastors. This leadership is in addition to that provided by staff members. Every effort is being made to provide the best leadership in the camp.

In order to be assured of accommodation at the camps applications must be in the hands of the respective directors by the following dates:

Girls: July 23rd, 1942. **Boys: August 1st, 1942.**

Camp fees are \$5.00 for the week plus \$1.00 Registration fee. Registration fee must accompany application.

HOW TO GET TO FISHER'S GLEN

Take most convenient route to Simcoe on Highway No. 3. Follow road signs through Simcoe 4 miles South. Turn right just after Port Dover turn. 3 miles to Vittoria. Turn left 2½ miles to Fisher's Glen.

WHAT TO BRING

Bible, writing paper, postcards and envelopes.

Three warm quilts or blankets (old). One cushion or pillow (old). One empty bed tick, to be filled with straw for mattress. Straw will be provided by the camp.

Clothes, Girls'—Slacks and shorts, blouses and sweaters or jackets, bathing suit, sport shoes and socks, pyjamas, heavier shoes for wet weather.

Clothes, Boys'—Old trousers, sweaters, gym suit, running shoes, bathing suit, pyjamas, heavier shoes for wet weather, extra stockings, underwear and shirts.

LEAVE YOUR BEST CLOTHES AT HOME

Miscellaneous—Towels, soap, tooth brush, comb, safety pins, needles and thread.

No trunks or boxes allowed. Bring all belongings in an old suit case or a canvas kit bag. Label everything with your name.

Optional—Camera, raincoat, musical instruments, fishing tackle.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Boys and girls from ages 10-16 inclusive may attend.

Campers must arrange their own transportation to camp.

A Camp Bank will be maintained for the convenience of campers and will handle postage stamps. Spending money will be limited each day. A tuck shop is operated at the Glen.

Those who play musical instruments are asked to bring them along. Instruments can be kept in camp office.

Awards will be given to campers for highest standing in Athletics, Aquatics, Bible Study, Handicrafts, etc. The awards of the Order of the Crosses will be given for general proficiency and participation in all activities.

Swimming will be at regular stated periods and under supervision of Instructor and Life Guards.

First camp meal will be served at 5.15 p.m.

(Supper) on opening Sunday of both camps.
