SEVEN NEW FACULTY NAMED

TO WATERLOO UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

Seven new faculty members, including two alumni, have been appointed to Waterloo University College, the arts and science faculty of Waterloo Lutheran University. The appointments were announced today by Dr. Lloyd H. Schaus, dean of Waterloo University College.

The appointments bring to twelve the number of new faculty members coming to WUC for the 1964-65 academic year.

Dr. John C. O'Brien has been appointed associate professor of economics. Dr. O'Brien was born in Hamilton, Scotland, and received his Bachelor of Commerce degree from the University of London, England, and his Master of Arts and Doctorate of Philosophy in economics from the University of Notre Dame, Indiana. He has taught at high schools in Scotland and Ontario, and at the University of Notre Dame, the University of British Columbia, the University of Saskatchewan, and the University of Dayton, Ohio.

Miss Mary K. Lane, who taught at Waterloo University College for two years before going to the University of London, England, for her Ph.D. work, is returning as assistant professor of psychology. She gained her B.A. and M.A. degrees from the University of Western Ontario, London.

A graduate in honours English and history from WUC this spring,

George A. Tompkins has been named lecturer in English. Mr. Tompkins worked

part-time as an ambulance driver in Kitchener-Waterloo during his undergraduate

days, and wrote his honours thesis on the history of the K-W hospital. He is a

native of Baden, Ontario and attended high school in Listowel.

Another alumnus returning as a lecturer in business administration at WUC this fall is <u>Daniel Dengler</u>, who has just completed his Master of Business Administration degree at the University of Detroit, after graduating from WUC in honours business administration in 1963. Mr. Dengler, of Cobalt, Ontario, spent 27 years with mining industries serving in payroll stores, accounting and purchasing, before taking up undergraduate studies at WUC.

Robert E. Alexander has been named lecturer in philosophy. A graduate of Concordia College, Moorehead, Minnesota, Mr. Alexander obtained his M.A. from Johns Hopkins University, Baltimore, Md., in June.

Mrs. Eleanor Evans, of Ancaster, Ontario, becomes a lecturer in classics. She graduated with honours from McMaster University, Hamilton, in 1960, and obtained her M.A. from the University of Minnesota this spring. While at Minnesota Mrs. Evans was working as a teaching fellow.

Mother of five children, Mrs. Mary E. Snyder has been appointed lecturer in physics. Mrs. Snyder holds a B.Sc. degree from the University of Western Ontario, London, and her M.Sc. degree in mathematics and physics from the University of Waterloo.

Dean Schaus also announced that the two faculty members, who had been away for a year pursuing post-graduate studies, will be returning to Waterloo University College this fall.
