Hyatt came to New Trier High school from the University of Wisconsin, where he had been a student, specializing in physiology and physical lver education, and later an instructor in bles the department of physical education. Prior to taking up athletics Mr. Hyatt spent two years in the College of Engineering preparing himself for the pro-OXES fession of forestry, deciding eventually, however, that forestry as a life work did not appeal to him.

During his sophomore year Mr. Hyatt entered the only intercollegiate competition of his career, representing his Alma Mater in the Western Intercollegiate Gymnastic meet held of Aquatics and Physical Training Inat the University of Minnesota where he was awarded an emblem for ex-

cellence at tumbling and club swinging. The director of athletics at the Badger university recognized in Mr. Hyatt great possibilities as an athlete and at the end of his sophomore year offered him a position as an assistant instructor in the athletic department.

Accepting this offer, Mr. Hyatt abandoned the ranks of the amateur athlete and entered the field of sports as a professional. During his first year as a coach he had no connection with swimming but his excellent physique of ERY6 foot 1, together with the 195 pounds of "beef" he carried, rendered him Cream peculiarly adapted to water sports and the natatorium of the university found him a frequent visitor with the result that interest was aroused and he was ncoln not long in becoming an exponent of aquatic pastimes.

At the end of his junior year Mr. Hyatt was called into the office of the director of athletics and offered the directorship of the department of aquatics. Mr. Hyatt accepted and entered into swimming in dead earnest. During the vacation season Mr. Hyatt came to Chicago for special coaching in aquatics. Hard work under such renowned authorities as Cavill, Bacharach and White sent him back to Madison in the fall with a fund of knowledge ent correlative to water sports that made of his first year as swimming coach an unith fiqualified success.

please Hyatt-coached swimming teams twice defeated Northwestern and Chicago and his water-polo teams took honors from Chicago twice and secured an even break with Northwestern. His second year at Wisconsin was equally successful. Much of the credit for this success properly belongs to Coach Hyatt for he personally collected funds with which to send Taylor to Chicago, besides inspiring within him the courage to enter the lists against a world champion and Olympic contestant.
