

Young Searle first came under the notice of Coach Hyatt at the Chicago A. U. championships in the Illinois Athletic club, when the future mainay of the New Trier championship swimming team was announced for an khibition crawl stroke swim. The little chap walked boldly out onto the igh diving board, paused for a moment, and then made a perfect dive from Carltonhe ten-foot board. At a later meet he swam 20 yards in :123/5 and made 40 ards in :28-two records that still stand for boys under 12 years of age. Immediately upon his entrance to New Trier, Searle tried out for the wimming team, making it with his feet tied. Shortly afterward he was empelled to undergo an operation for appendicitis which kept him from articipating in water sports for several months. He celebrated his return the team by beating the Oak Park star, Mott, in the 220-yard race in the nterscholastic at the University of Wisconsin.

S Searle took part in many dual meets, placing in every one and winning is "NT" emblem. Searle has an admirable physique, an immense reserve ower, a bull dog determination to win and the aquatic ability to carry out hat determination. He is an extremely dangerous rival for any swimmer STON, Inywhere near him in class.

Jack Searle has always been loyal to New Trier, though tempting offers ave been made him by different athletic associations. A long list of honors on might be named but in keeping with his innate modesty Jack is un-N SERV illing to enumerate his victories. His private den, however, is decorated ith medals and trophies galore-silent testimonials to his ability and skill. For some time Searle has been having difficulty with several of the ancient comans, including Caesar, and it is only lately that he has been able to ersuade them that he is needed on New Trier's "Rubikand." High School Graduates Studying Engineering in Evanston Given High Marks at Semester End.

The following paragraph, quoted from a notice now on the bulletin board in regard to scholastic records broken in the College of Engineering in the first semester of 1916-17, is interesting:

"T. S. Moulding, at the end of the first semester of 1916-17, had an average of 91.2 on 116 hours of credit. This is the highest average mark to date for a senior at the end of the first semester. The best previous record was made by E. A. Anderson at the end of the first semester of 1915-16, an average mark of 90.0 on 126 hours of credit."
