WASTE PAPER STORAGE IS FREQUENT FIRE CAUSE

Dreaded Menace Should Be Guarded Against-Place in Containers of Metal and Bale Every Day.

In order to obviate as much as possible the shortage in paper stock, incident to war conditions, a campaign for the saving of waste paper has been inaugurated throughout the country. This campaign has been brought about at the suggestion of the United States Government, and has been carried into the public schools, academies and other public buildings.

Pupils and tenants have been solicited to bring waste paper for accumulation and concentration. The fire hazard resulting therefrom has caused the state fire marshal to issue a warning to school authorities and property holders. Already a number of fires have occurred directly traceable to this cause, and indications are that these losses will offset the saving which the Government intended when the suggestion was offered.

In order to guard against this fire menace, metal containers should be provided for the storage of waste paper, and, in schools where a large amount may be accumulated, a baler should be installed and the paper baled each day. If this is not done the paper should not be permitted to be kept in the building over night. A baler can be purchased for a nominal sum, and will prove a reasonable protection from the danger of fire from this cause.
