CONFEDERATE VETERAN WOULD FIGHT FOR UNION

J. H. Leigh of Arkansas Tries to Join United States Navy-Hale and Hearty at Age of Sixty-Nine.

That the surviving members of the "Legions of '61" are as much imbued with the spirit of patriotism today as they were during the stirring days of the Rebellion was amply demonstrated a few days ago at Little Rock, Arkansas, when J. L. Leigh, a veteran of Lee's Confederate Army and 69 years old, applied for enlistment at the United States Navy re-

Leigh requested that he be enlisted at once and assigned to service on the largest battleship afloat. He was greatly disappointed when informed by the recruiting officer that he exceeded the required age limit by some forty-odd years. Leigh enlisted in the Confederate Army at the age of thirteen, serving continuously until April, 1865, when General Lee surrendered at Appomattox. He took part in many battles and skirmishes, suffered all the privations that were endured by officers and men alike and today feels he is still capable of shouldering a musket in defense of his flag, the Stars and Stripes.

SHINGLE ROOFS CAUSE OF IMMENSE LOSS BY FIRE

Nearly Million Dollars Property Loss First Two Months of Year-Restrictive Measures Advocated.

The menace of the wooden shingle as a means for fire is becoming so alarming that stringent measures should be taken to overcome the large property losses due to this cause.

During the months of January and February, 1917, there were reported to the State Fire Marshal Department 1,934 fires caused from sparks on shingle roofs, entailing a property loss of \$990,469. Of this number, 1,143 occurred during the month of February. This number is in excess of the total number of fires reported to the Department during the year 1916 as being caused by sparks on roofs. During that period there were 1,861 fires, causing a property loss of \$872,-366, or \$100,000 less than the loss for the first two months of the year 1917. This condition arises from the fact that there was little or no moisture during the first two months of the . In a single day the shingle roof caused conflagrations in the cities of Nashville, Tennessee, Paris, Texas, and Augusta, Georgia, entailing a loss of \$10,000,000.

Many cities are now considering ordinances which prohibit shingle roofs, not only in the fire limits, but in the residence districts of cities. A few have already adopted such an ordinance. In view of the immense losses to the property assets of the state it is important that village authorities give this matter due consideration, and take steps toward the "One of the strongest indorsements adoption of an ordinance that will eliminate the shingle roof.
