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## **LEWIS GETS REPORT** ON MISSING AIRMAN

Illinois Senator Receives Information That Campbell Went Down Fighting Germans.

CONRADES SAW MACHINE

Sergit. Campbell's Plane Dives Behind the Teuton Lines.

The state department at Washingon, D. C., received a message this week regarding the fate of Sergt. Anrew Courtney Campbell, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. A. Courtney Campbell, Navy Yard, N. Y. Kenilworth.

Senator James Hamilton Lewis obtained information that Sergt. Campell went down from his aeroplane fighting against odds within the German lines. The message was to this

Sergt. Campbell, a flyer with the Camp Grant. aFayette escadrille and a distinguished pilot, was last seen in a batle with three German planes on ctober 1. Later a French pilot in Camp Grant. neighboring squadron reported that he had seen a biplane of a type the sergeant was flying fall in a spinning nose-dive inside the German lines.

Young Campbell, who joined the escadrille in the summer of 1916, has base hospital, England: long been known as one of the squadron's most daring flyers. His deeds have won him many war trophies and recognition from the military leaders of the Allies.

His expedition over the German ines was one of a series of daily trips. Teuton aviators had great respect for the Kenilworth pilot and his skill in handling his plane won many air duels for himself and his companions.

### Awarded Medal.

Sergt. Campbell has been fighting the Germans in the air since May 30, France. when he sent the first enemy's plane downward into its own lines. Following this first encounter, the books of the squadron carried many official reports of his daring work and victories over the German lines.

He also went on record as accomplishing a feat, the first of its kind in the aviation game, when he was a mile above the earth. The left wing of his airplane broke off and was hanging on the wire cables, with excellent opportunities of disabling his machine. In an instant Sergt. Campbell threw his control on the right side of his machine and detached the broken wing and volplaned to the nearest beet field, landing without injury.

For this Sergt. Campbell received the Military Medal. He has also been mentioned in many official reports for his daring work and bril- and inspected the trenches built and liant victories.

The Ford Camionette costs 6,000 francs (\$1,200.00) if bought here now through the Red Cross; otherwise, all the Ford cars are commandeered by the military. If it was sent from America, it would not reach us for three months and would limit our usefulness. We are waiting now for our permits to go into the war mone, for the government is overwhelmed with work and it all takes time. bus
