DR. BROWN WRITES OF GERMAN AIR RAIDERS

(Continued from page 1)

broken glass. While I was buying some oilcloth, the siren rang, which meant for everyone to disappear down in the caves. Miss M—, who is one of our drivers, and I, were taken by our hostess of the store into an old wine cellar, which had been furnished with a bed for her children, two chaise lounges and some stools. There were twelve of us in the cave; we had no sooner reached there than the guns began firing their high explosives. It takes eleven men to fire one shot at the avions. Every now and then a bomb would be dropped from the German plane. The distinction was easily made by the sound.

"After an hour the bombs seemed to some nearer us, and I was beginning to feel that never again would I see daylight. At twenty minutes past seven o'clock, one dropped within a block of us; it shook and rocked us so, that I said, 'This ends all.'

"Never have I lived through anything like it. There was an old lady with us, upon whose face the despair of age was written, when the bomb dropped so near us, she gave a groan in which we all joined. Presently, when the firing ceased, we thought we might venture out. We ran up to crank the Ford and then down again to walk—and then out again.

Finally we got started and reached home at 10:30 o'clock.

"T— and N— are the towns through which the soldiers are marched to the front, and that is why they are so severely bombarded. Saturday morning, between 3 and 6 o'clock, they were 'at it' again. The French successfully brought down three German Zeppelins; they were the ones returning from England and lost their way. We are feeling quite happy about it. However, it is only momentary, for, while I have been writing, a Boche has passed over us and the siren is signalling again. Some of our buildings have caves, but no more caves for me; I prefer to be where I can at least run if necessary to breathe.

"The American troops went into the trenches yesterday, not far from here at B—. They are the regulars. Miss N—, returning from N— yesterday, passed many camion loads of them, all helmeted, and brought us the news.

"I have had so many interruptions since I began this letter that I cannot clearly express what I wish. When the Winnetka Ford ambulance comes and is ready for work, I will have a picture taken and send it to Winnetka.

"My love to one and all. It is a comfort to think of you, even if I may never see you all again. 'E'st la guerre' is the explanation of everything here.

RED CROSS WORKERS USE SPHAGNUM MOSS

Three hundred and fifty thousand dressings of sphagnum moss are being turned out every month in England. Sir Edward Wood has established depots in England and Ireland to forward these dressings to the base hospitals. In February of 1916 Great Britain's war office pronounced these moss dressings as the official surgical dressing.

Sphagnum moss is cheaper, lighter, more highly absorbent than cotton for most surgical dressings. The bogs in the south are full of this precious moss, to be had for the picking.
