The West Elm Street circle will meet next Tuesday afternoon with Mrs. D. W. Poff, 972 Elm Street.

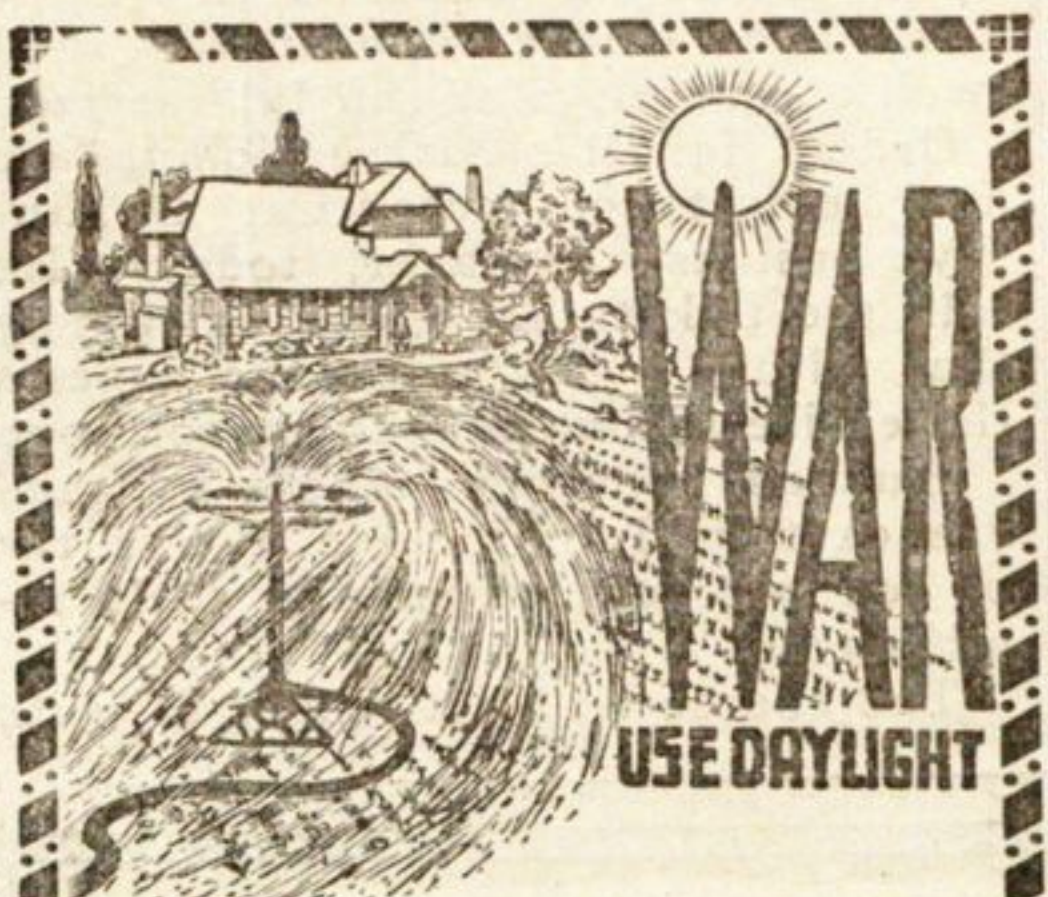
Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Anning, 744 Prospect avenue, have returned from an extended visit in the north.
